

Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General for copies of any correspondence respecting the case of M.S. Bidwell, Esquire, since His Excellency's assumption of the Government.

(Copy). Mr. Robert Baldwin having been informed by Mr. Secretary Harrison, that with reference to a case of Mr. Bidwell, which Mr. Baldwin had the honor of bringing under the notice of the Governor General, shortly after his assumption of the Government, His Excellency only requires a request to be made to him as a foundation for his desiring that the pledge taken from that gentleman on his departure from Upper Canada should be cancelled, and giving His Excellency's sanction for the introduction into parliament of a bill to restore to Mr. Bidwell, the political rights of which his residence abroad, under pressure of that pledge has deprived him. Mr. Baldwin respectfully begs leave to make such request.

(Copy). Secretary's Office (West). Kingston, 29th May, 1843.

I am commanded by the Governor General to inform you in reply to your note of the 25th instant, that His Excellency considers it right that whatever pledge may have been given by Mr. Bidwell on his departure from Upper Canada, to preclude his return, should be cancelled. The letter of that gentleman to the Hon. Lieut. Governor, Sir P. B. Head, supposed to contain such a pledge, is not in the archives of the Secretary's Office; I am therefore directed to say that the pledge is considered as cancelled, and that the letter, if ever found, may be returned.

I am also further directed to acquaint you that in the event of Mr. Bidwell's proposing to return, His Excellency will give his sanction to the introduction into parliament next session, of a bill to restore to that gentleman the political rights, of which his residence abroad under the pressure of that pledge has deprived him.

THE ANTIQUITIES OF EGYPT.—The paper read by Mr. Bartlett, at the meeting of the New York Historical Society, contained the following interesting particulars of the modern expedition to the land of the Pharaohs.

Egypt continues to be the land of wonders, and attracts to its venerable monuments the learned of all nations. The magnificent work by the savans who accompanied Napoleon, which was published under his auspices, was thought to embrace all the wonders of that country. But France has contributed another work, equally important, by the lamented Champollion, and when we close this list with the splendid work by Rossellini, under the patronage of the Tuscan government, which embraces all the recent discoveries in Egyptian archaeology and hieroglyphy, we must acknowledge that no part of the world has been more thoroughly investigated and described. Yet we have to announce a new scientific commission, sent to the land of the Pharaohs by that patron of learning, the King of Prussia. At its head is placed Dr. Lepsius, one of the most distinguished philologists and antiquaries of Europe.

This gentleman has already made some remarkable discoveries in and about the Pyramids; but the most important is that of the celebrated labyrinth, a short account of which we extract from his late letters, published in London, dated Pyramid of Meir, June 20th.

"We have now been settled for some weeks at the ruins of the labyrinth of Meir, and I hasten to give you the information of the definite discovery of the site of the true labyrinth and pyramid. We were astonished that earlier travellers had scarcely mentioned these remains when we saw the ruins of hundreds of still well defined chambers lying before us. The main result of our investigation is, however, the finding on many of the pillars and architraves of the hall the name of the true Meir, who built the labyrinth for his palace, and the pyramid for his tomb.—This pyramid is the latest of all the pyramids of the Pharaohs. Ruin Meir is regarded from 2194 to 2151, B. C. (or 4037 years ago) and was the last king of the old kingdom of Egypt before its conquest by the Hyksos. Both the labyrinth and the lake prove his power, his love of magnificence and his interest in the welfare of his people. At the end of the east plain lies the pyramid in which Meir was buried, with the ruins of the village, precisely as described by Strabo. Near this were many hillocks, beneath which we found several hundred chambers, some of them with roofs, corridors and columns. The rooms were so irregular, and of such various sizes, that no one could have found his way, without a guide, through this mass of buildings.—Herodotus describes 3000 apartments above and below the ground, an account which the remains lead me to believe not exaggerated.

The ruins of the most important part of the palace are described by Herodotus as consisting of twelve halls, that is, of twelve open courts surrounded by covered colonnades. This palace was surrounded by labyrinthine buildings on three sides, a wall intersected by a water course. Here our establishment occupy the ruins of the pyramid, and recall the old village of Strabo which lay on the same level with the pyramid. Around us are scattered huge blocks of granite, the remains of old pillars and architraves of the courts, which are of interest, as offering in several cases the names of the builder, Meir, and his sister, who succeeded him, and employing one hundred workmen in digging into the chambers, and latterly in searching for the entrance into the pyramid."

WARRANT FOR BOOTS AND SHOES, BY WHICH THEY ARE RENDERED WATER-PROOF.—Take a pint of hussel oil, with half a pound of nutmeg, six or eight ounces of bees-wax, and a small piece of resin. Boil them in a pipkin, and let the liquid cool till milk-warm—then with a brush lay it on boots or shoes. The leather must be perfectly dry.

CURE FOR THE BLACK TONGUE.—A handful of fine salt rubbed upon the tongue of a horse that has the black tongue will effect a cure, in at most two applications.
