utmost value. It was interpreted that the Rosetta inscription has already been set up in other temples; and the learned expressed a hope that in the course of time one or more of them might reward the research of zealous antiquaries. That hope has been fulfilled. Dr. Lepsius has discovered another copy of the Rosetta inscription at Merce!! The hieroglyphic portion is unusually perfect, and so we are informed is the other Ezyptian writing. Now, then the three legends may be compared throughout; and we hesitate not to say that this is likely to create a great revolution by a vast accession to our means of know. a gratifying circumstance that the noble expedition of the King of Prussia should have uset with this return. Copies of the inscription have, we understand, been made for Berlin; but the main fact was communicated by letter to his excellen-cy the Chevalier Bunsen, the Prussian minister in London.

We believe that Dr. Lepsius is directed completely to explore all this upper division of the country, and will not revisit Cairo till that is accomplished, probably about April. After some repose the expedition will proceed to Syria to examine the Egyptian inscriptions there; and from what has already transpired, there can be no doubt but that an extraordinary new light will be thrown over the old world by this regally liberal, auspicious, and fortunate effort.—[London Lit. Gaz.

## THE DUPLICATE ROSETTA STONE.

Dr. Lepsius's letter to A. Von Humbold' (Korusko, 20th Nov.,)\* respecting this interesting discovery has been published in the Universal Prussien Gazette, and other German periodicals; but the notice of it in the Literary Gazette was the first intelligence received in Paris, whore it created considerable sensation. M Letropres Literary Comments of the Considerable sensation. tronne, so high an authority on these subjects has given his opinion in the Journal des Debats, where he doubts the finding of this monument at where he doubts the finding of this monument at Meroc, as that place was not at the period under the sway of Egypt. This astute criticism is, we are glad to say, founded upon an error on our part, in stating Meroc to be the locality where Dr. Lepsius obtained the Stone. A more circumstantial account has since reacled us; and it was at Phille, in the court of the great temple of Isis, on his way to Meroc, that this literary bilingual treasure was discovered. It contains the whole text of the decree in honour of Ptolemy Epiphanes, which the Rosetta Stone exhibits, both in hieroglyphics and echorial characters. And it has besides another decree, in honour of the same king; but the Gresk text has never existed in either of these monument. This is of little consequence, as it is so nearly complete in the Stone in the British Mus um.—Dr. Lepsius's letter shows that the Philas Stone Dr. Lepsius's letter shows that the Phile Stone Dr. Lepsius's letter shows that the Phile Stone contains nothing beyond what we have mentioned; and therefore not the preamble to the decree of the Rosetta Stone. Dr. L. has collected about four hundred Greek inscriptions in Egypt and Nubia, which he will bring with him to Europe. The Phile Stone has, we have heard, been already despatched for Berlin.—[Literary Gazette, March 2d.

THE DUPLICATE ROSETTA STONE DISCOVERED BY THE LATE MR. SALT.

The following communication is from a distinguished scholar, particularly conversant with the subject of hieroglyphics:— Highbury, March 4, 1844.

The announcement in the Athenaum, in a letter from Dr. Lepsius, of the discovery by that active Prussian traveller, of a duplicate copy of the Rosetta stone, is so important, that it may be interesting to your readers to be told that the discovery is by no means new; the existence of the inscription was already known to the English students of hieroglyphics. This inscription on the wall of the temple of Isis at Phila, was discovered twenty years ago by the late Mr. Salt, our consul in Egypt, who published the first and last two lines of it in his "Essay on the Phonetic System," London, 1825. Mr. Salt describes the inscription as sadly imperfect; it had been mutilated by having had, at a very early time, another inscription of larger hierogly-phics carved over it; and the beginning was wanting. Underneath is the corresponding inscription in the Enchorial character. Since the time of Mr. Salt's publication we have been hoping to receive from some of our travellers a more complete copy of this valuable stone; and for this we shall feel not less thankful to Dr. Lepsius because the existence of the stone itself is not his discovery. is not his discovery.

The great interest which must attach to this The great interest which must attach to this important communication has induced us to consult Salt's work, and the following is, we suppose, the passage referred to:—At Phile I discovered, rather high up on the side of a temple, two double inscriptions, each in small hieroglyphical and its corresponding encherial characters, which seemed on examination to bear great analogy to the Rosetta inscription. Unfortunately all of them have been cut through and most sadly effaced by figures and larger hieroglyphics, subsequently carved on the walls. I made out, however, on my last journey, by the assistance of a ladder, with great difficulty, and several days' labour, taking such moments as the sun favoured my project, a great part of the first, (see Plate V. No. 1,) and the two last lines of one of the inscriptions, (Plate V. No. 2; and in the former we have most fortunately the formula complete, which is wanting in the Rosetta inscription, that runs thus:—"Son of the Sun, Ptolemy immortal, beloved of Pthah, God illustrious, son of the King Ptolemy and his sister, Ptolemy immortal, beloved of Pthah, God illustrious, son of the King Ptolemy and his sister, full of wisdom, Cleopatra, God's Epiphanes;"—and in the last line we have "in letters of the second, and third class, whereon is sculptured an image of the king full of wisdom, Son of the Sun, Ptolemy and his queen and his wife Cleopatra, God's beneficent."—[London Athenaum, March 9th.
