Our agreement with them will not expire until next April, as we intimated last week; but as it was only verbal, and without witnesses, we could not enforce it : nor would it be worth while to do so if we could. We mention the fact only to shew that the Corporation care as little for breaking faith as for misappropriating public money. Poor fellows! Their aldermanic stomachs could not digest the roast beef and plum pudding with which we have fed them, so they turn to the News for leeks and Welsh rabbit. We should have been pleased if their actions had been such as we could have commended, but they have not. They have involved the Town in a debt of above £30, 000-they have taken public money for their own use, by which a large sum will be entirely lost to the Town, and have done many other things that deserve the severest reprobation. A more unfit set of men never wormed themselves into petty office than are a majority of the Kingston Corporation.
