The Jury gave a verdict for the plaintiff—One shilling damages.

Victoria College—its internal government. Mr. Errol, the temporary retirement of Dr. Ryerson from his duties as Principal of Victoria College was the occasion of satisfaction and joy to all who are really interested in the welfare of the Institution.
