"The settlers on the River Chez Marse were clearing their lands and burning, the drought was great, and on Tuesday the 4th inst., the wind coming on to blow furiously, the flames were carried along the settlement, destroying houses, that the long agitated question of the Glergy Reserves, has again become a subject of discussion and contention in this Province.
