The Tarif bill has passed the Congress of the United States. The vote in the Senate was 27 nays to 28 yeas, and on engrossing the bill, it stood equal, 27 on each side. The casting vote was given by Mr. Dallas, the Vice President, in favor of the bill. An amendment was made by the Senate, which was agreed to by the House, and the bill would be signed by the President forthwith. The new tariff reduces the duties on many kinds of manufactures, and therefore will be acceptable in England as a return for the reductions there on American breadstuffs. The ductions there on American breadstuffs. The rates on iron and cloths are now 30 per cent, the old rate was for the former from 73 to 168, and on the latter from 38 to 40. On cotton prints the duty is now 25 per cent; formerly 50.
