It is matter of surprise that the radical papers in this Province sit so quietly under this annual loss of £4000... that the wonder is easily explained. They reformers that rob us; therefore our medicals hold their peace, as they did when our reformer Assembly gave Mackenzie and O'Grady £300 for doing nothing. Another intolerable grievance is, that we are not the command of the St. Lawrence Canal, nor will Lower Canada so improve the navigation as to render that canal unnecessary. In three years our St. Lawrence canal will render the river navigation of the Lake Steam-Boats and Schooners through this Province, but then we are stopped. The rapids in the Lower Province are yet untouched and impassable. If animals were cut round them similar to ours, a vessel might sail from the upper lakes through the Welland and St. Lawrence canals to Montreal or Quebec without break. This would much of the present experience, difficulty and danger of transferring produce be avoided, and our interest would be greatly increased. When the subject of improving the river navigation was mentioned in the Assembly at Quebec a year or two since, Mr. Papineau said they would wait until they saw whether the rapids could not be navigated by the boat that was then building for that purpose on Burden's plan. That experiment has been made, and has decidedly failed—There is nothing left now but to fall on and cut canals as speedily as possible round the lower rapids. If Lower Canada will not do this, we must have that part of the country to Montreal added to this Province, let Mr. Papineau grow as he pleases. There are other minor grievances inflicted by the present relations between Upper and Lower Canada, but let those above mentioned be redressed first, and we will then fill our budget again, and so proceed to the Papineau.

About a month since a Mr. Wilson arrived here from England, designing to purchase land, and brought with him a box of specie supposed to be worth £500. He said a few days at Wm. Carrel's Canal Coffee House, and on departing for Toronto to enquire for land, left his box of money in Carrel's care. Carrel, who has resided several years in Kingston, proved dishonest, and decamped for the States with the box of dollars. Owing to Mr. Wilson's absence nothing was done to arrest the fugitive until he may fairly be supposed to be out of reach.
