For Emigrants this line of communication is particularly advantageous, as they can embark with their luggage on board of decked Barges which are towed through Kingston by Steamboats, as above mentioned, without being subjected to the great inconvenience of landing and walking past the Rapids, as is the case by the St. Lawrence route.
