BOARD OF HEALTH.

In order to promote the public health, and to guard against infectious Diseases, the Members of the Board of Health for the Town of Kingston and vicinity, have been formed into divisions, as follows, viz:

First Division—West of William-street, John Strang, George Baker, and east of Brewery-street—John S. Cartwright, Dr. Robinson.

Second Division—From Brock-street to William-street—John S. Cartwright, Dr. Robinson.

Third Division—From Brock-street to Queen-street, and south of Rear-street—J. Macfarlane, T. Kirkpatrick, A. Trux.

Fourth Division—From Queen-street east to the Barracks, including south side of Brewery-street—John Macaulay, Dr. Armstrong, William Wilson.

Fifth Division—From section of Quarry-street and Grave-street, north to Ridge-street including south side of Ridge-street, and east of Brewery-street—James Sampson, Alex. Pringle, W. McCanniff, J. Conter.

Sixth Division—North of Ridge-street—D. J. Smith, John Mowat, Joseph Bruce.

Seventh Division—From Penitentiary to the limits of the Town—Hon. C. W. Grant, H. Smith, Senr.

Eighth Division—Village of Barriefield, John Kirby, John Marks, and Doctor Dormer.

The officers of the Board of Health are particularly desired to use all diligence in examining and causing the inhabitants to remove all pigs and other unclean animals or filthy matter from their houses, out-houses, premises, or about the doors in the streets, which, in the opinion of the said officers, may endanger the public health.

The Board will visit the different divisions on and after the 23rd inst.

The Board of Health will meet at the Court House, every Tuesday at twelve o'clock, noon, to receive the Reports of the Officers of each division, and for the purpose of making such wholesome regulations as the state of the town may require.
