With us, therefore, many cases of this character depend upon hist principles and the judicial decisions which apon first principles and the judicial decisions which particular cases have occasioned in their application. The rule I have mentioned has in that way experienced modification, and it has been held that frequently, though the visible possession continues in the owner, so that its fraudulent removal or conversion may constitute a felonious taking or Larceny,—es plate and other domestic articles in the charge of servants—goods, &c. in the charge of clarks, to which may be added the baggage or property of travellers in the charge of lunkeepers on one hand, and utensits set before such travellers for use in eating and drinking on the other. In such like instances the possession is deemed to continue in the owner, though subject to a qualified possession in the others; and it is laid down in general terms that if a person to whom goods are delived the more interesting and interest of the proposed in the course of furthering justice, or to bend it to the devices ends of oppression, rendered doubly odious owing to the subterfuge and fails prefere under which it takes refuge. Being so endowed the more inpossession in the others; and it is fail down in general terms that if a person to whom goods are delivered has only the bare charge or custody of them, and the legal possession remain in the owner, such person may commit Larceny by their fraudulent to whom any other than any low men-to act uprightly their part-to run with undeviating rectitude the race set before them according to the best of their ability-thereby presenting the illustrious examples they are expected to afford, and fulfilling the great ends for which they were appointed. They should pay diligent attention to all the evidence laid before them, and strive with laudable circumspection to separate truth from falsehood, and to soften down in their minds hyperbolical or exaggerated represe or descriptions to their just dimension—to and allow due weight to solid and well grounded reasoning—but acutely to detect and firmly to re-ject the persuasive delusions of sophistry and the

ssionate assaults of declamation.

There will be found a mental purification in such invigorating considerations not to be treated with levity or thought off lightly. It would be equally foolish and criminal, to conceal from ourpursuit of serious things, the lives, the property, the dearest interests and the cherished hopes of many of our Friends and Neighbours, or of the nger that is within our gates are entrusted to-They will not deem it idle in thought or redundant in words, that we should thus on the verge on that edifice which ought ever to represent truly the Tempie of Justice recollect and refrease what we know to be due to them, and what we admit they have a right to look for a our llands; that we should feel inwardly and ayow openly our pure convictions of the calls of duty tow and ourselves with good resolutions to fulfi) the same in deed and if truth. To accomplish this effectually, it is desirable that with the inclination there should be combined a mutual confidence and

a mutual confidence, and a joint exertion to suceed in its attainment.

That Juries should hear with attention the legal opinions and judicial advice of the Judge that the Judge should rely without auxiety upon the integrity and discrimination of the Jury—and that the Suitors should rest assured of the sincere and zealous co-operation of both Court and Jury, to do justice between the litigant parties according to the law of the land, and the real merits as they shall appear to them under the evidence. When such wide spread confidence prevails, springing from those sources which alone can nourish or expand it, a happy state is reached in judicial advancement, a state which should always be kept in view, and to which we should always sedulonally aspire.

In the perplexing and intricate mazes of juris-prudence, we may, in the imperfection or infirmity of our natural and best ordered faculties, still err, but such venial failure need not engender remorse It is only expected of us that we should use of best endeavours to continue in the right way, a to gain correct results—a right way, and to gain correct results—a right judgment in all things is hardly to be hoped for—it would be presumptuous to pretend to it—and while a sense of this should inspire as with the more prudence and caution, and bespeak the more deliberation and care in the formation of our opinious, still those mistakes into which the most circumspect, upright and intelligent, may sometimes fall, whether through weakness of understanding or obscurity in favourable circumstances, but their effect, or the inference to be drawn therefrom, rests of course in inference to be drawn therefrom, rests of course in the lights afforded for their guidance, though they may excite regret and be lamented, they afford no just cause of bitterness or self reproach.
