Nov. 11th.—The Money Market.—The presure upon the money market in London was to be somewhat diminishing. The Bank was discounting liberally all bona fide commercial bills upon satisfactory security. The state of the exchange no longer offered inducements for the exportation of gold to the United States, and but little was flowing to the continent. On the whole, the aspect of business was improving. Some of the London papers think the New York press has manifested an unwarrantable degree of anger toward the bank of England, because of its refusal to discount bill of good American houses.
