RAILROAD FROM TORONTO. RAILROAD FROM TORONTO.

Having been requested by some gentlemen connected with the Railroad about to be laid down from this City to Lake Huron, to state my opinion respecting any advantages which may be apparent to me from Geological acquaintance with the country it will pass through, or near, and having also had a fine specimen of bituminous shale bro't to me to day by Mr. Stennett, I address you as requested, to give the public any information on the subject I may possess, either from my personal investigation, or from the numerous specimens of the Rocks of the region between Huron and Ontario which have been sent to my cabinet.

But as the space in a public Journal is necessarily limited, I must as briefly as possible at once detail merely the Geological advantages without entering at all into matters therewith connected, which although more interesting to the accentific world would merely occupy your columns, without rendering any service to others except to mere scientific enquirers.

The whole of this section of Canada including the space bounded by the South bank of the Matchedash or Severn River, Lake Simoe, Yonge Street, Lake Ontario, the Niagara River, Lakes Eric and Huron, appears to come under that Geological division in which minerals of utility rather than those of luxury, may be expected. Among these, coal, iron, lead, zinc, yerhaps copper; antimony, mineral oil, sulphur, pipe clay, potters clay, porcelain clay, linestone, gypsum and sandstone will be the most prominent.

In fact the whole country is one continued dis play of that section of rocks which pass so rapidly from the older secondary to the newer primitive or transition family and from the fossils usually found transition family and from the fossils usually found may without any great violation of geognestical principles, be termed, of the transition age, embracing the earboniferous formation of the American writers, including argilite, in which may be found CLAY SLATE, wacke slate, roofing state and glazed slate and in which will be discovered anthracite or mineral COAL, and marine ammal relics and traces of reeds and ferns in abundance, well and distinct-ly preserved.

Next in the quartzoze rocks of this family this region contains grey wacke slate, a fine cleaveable rock, and mill stone grit and grey rubble. These are good quarry stones; and one of their distanguishing marks is sometimes a red colour.

With this family, is the calcarcous or limestone division to well known to need further notice.

Also the calcarcous sandstone, an excellent coarse building material and when passing into course Hornstone as at Fort Erie a most excellent and durable material for Piers. Wharves. Canals.

course Hornstone as at Fort Erie a most excellent and durable material for Piers, Wharves, Canals, or any building much exposed to water or weather. This rock abounds in organic remains, furnishing the most beautiful specimens of the madrepores, corallines &c. of a former state of the world, and is quarried from the Thames at Brantford to Fort Erie, and perhaps in all the unexplored country North East of the Thames. I have a superb specimen of Madrepora Truncata taken from it near Brantford, and those curious fossil remains which look so exactly like honey combs found near Gravelly Bay on the Welland Canal, but which are really the work of marine animals of an unknown age, are from this rock.

The newer grey wacke, and the old red sandstone are so closely allied to these families of rocks as not to be traccable in this part of Upper Canada as separate and distinct formations, but then they indicate another order of things, for wherever they are found, they embrace the saliferous or salt formation, and the carboniferous or really regetable coal formation, two of the most useful minerals to man.

man.

I do not enters for reasons already stated into the questions of the differences between the nature of the several carboniferous rocks which are argued upon most learnedly by the Gaologists of New-York and Pennsylvania, but merely wish to refer my readers to the general fact that the whole of Upper Canada west of Toronto and Lake Sincoe and bounded by Huron and Erie is the country of salt and coal.

and bounded by Huron and Evic is the country of salt and coal.

The bituminous slate accompanying the coal and indicating its neighbourhood, may be known by its dark colour, almost black, by its easily dividing into thin tables, by its emitting the peculiar odour of bitumen when rubbed with a piece of sharp iron, and when placed on a hot stove, or the fire; by its leaving a brown powder and trace where it is scratched, and by its burning more or less easily, as also by its being full of impressions of leaves of succulent plants which are like a shield in shape and have wavy lines divided in three distinct parts within the borders of the shield. These fossils have been called tril bics by some writers, but they do not appear to me to resemble those marine insect remains found at Cobourg in the dark limestone any further than in outline, and are really the fossils of the coal shale. The greatest known deposit of this shale is in the Township of Collingwood in Nottawassaga. Bay, where it covers the country, and extends to the Manitoulin Islands at the new Indian settlement there, called Manitou-a-wanning, being very abundant—It is also found in digging wells &c. at Whitby, and some specimens may be picked up at Toronto on the Beach after a storm wherein the fossil impressions of leaves are brightly gilt with Iron pyrites.

On the shores of Huron near Penetanguishine and extending far along the north shore of the Lake, the primary or oldest transition rocks appear, but as far as the exploring party went, of which that able Geologist Captain Baddely reported the Geological discoveries, there seems no reason to think that any thing in the rocks of this non metalliferous granitic family, will be available.

Thus the proposed Railroad whichever route it pursues will either pass through or be immediately in the neighbourhood of countries possessing witheat doubt the two kinds of coal, mineral or anthracite, fit for the founder, and close stoves, and the vegetable coal for general fuel.
