WILLIAM W. SNOWDEN. LATEST FROM LOWER CANADA.

INSURRECTION IN LOWER CANADA. - We have given full details on this subject up to the march of the troops to St. Charles. As it is doubtful whether the Montreal mail will arrive in time to day for our going to press, we will give the substance of such further news as has come to hand.

was received yesterday at the British American Hotel, on which the following account was written:

"The toops on their way to St. Charles were stopped at St. Denis by a large body of the rebels, who fired on them. Firing was kept up on both sides from 10 o'clock till 2 yesterday (Thursday). Three or four of the troops were killed, and several wounded, among the latter, Capt. Markham, badly. It was supposed that many of the rebels were killed. They were in a fortified place. A strong re-inforcement left this morning at 5 o'clock 2 this account he carreet and its new second. clock." If this account be correct, and we suppose it is substantially, we must think that the troops

were not wisely directed. It may be presumption in us to speak on military matters, but we must think that keeping the troops firing four hours was not the way to conquer. Is it not known that in the use of fire arms the people of this country are as expert as the regular troops are? and therefore if battles are to be decided by firing, superior numbers must prevail .-Besides, the rifles carry further than muskets .-The troops should rely most on that in which they most excel--a charge with the bayonet. The rebels will stand fire, and return it with interest, but they will not stand the bayonet. If the charge was impracticable, the artillery might have fired red hot balls (there was wood enough to heat them) and have set the "fortified place" on fire; if they could not have dislodged the rebels otherwise. A good fire would have heated balls in half the time the troops were firing, and the men would not have been exposed at all. This may appear non sense, but we throwout the suggestion that the troops must rely on the bayonet, the artillery, and the volunteer Cavalry, not on firing muskets in which every habitan can equal them. Two regiments have left New Brunswick for Canada by land, the 43d, and 34th, and are probably at Quebec by this time. The gurs are replaced on the citadel at Quebec.

It appears that Capt. Markham with his compa ny was in advance of the other troops about six hours, marching in the middle of the night with rain, and in passing the old fort where the rebels have fortified themselves they fired on the company, and Capt. Markham received three balls in his body. He is not expected to live. His company fell back on the main body.
