Our English news is to the 20th of February, and copious details will be found in previous columns. In addition we find the following items in the Commercial Advertiser, as an epitome of opinions expressed in a debate in the House of Lords...

It may be expected perhaps, that we should give some opinion on the character of the measures proposed and adopted by the Home Government for the pacifying of Canada, and on considering the whole, we have sufficient reason to be satisfied therewith.

The U. C. Herald is no "doubtful organ of truth," as the rebels and pirates know in which they have long been deficient. For a long time ministers have clung to the frail fragment of a hope, that by their liberal concessions to popular clamour in Lower Canada they would at length satisfy every demand, and bring the factious Assembly to rest in the possession of all but Sovereign power.

The fine weather has produced great activity on the Steam Boats that have wintered here, to prepare them for a speedy opening of the navigation. The Brockville has received a thorough repair on the Marquette Rail Way, being filled in with new timbers, beams, planks and sheathing, so that she is a stronger and better boat than she ever was before.

The appointment of Earl Durham as Governor in Chief is, on the whole, a good one. It is true that he is a liberal reformer, perhaps the most liberal among the aristocracy; yet we apprehend no danger on that account.

The Americans appear to be making innovations in the principles and usages of international law and comity, without considering much, if at all, how their innovations may in turn affect themselves. The British Government applied some time ago to the Governor of the State of New York, for the surrender of two men named John and James Bamber, to be taken home to answer a charge of murder, committed in Ireland several years since.

By private accounts from Toronto, we learn that His Excellency Sir George Arthur and son arrived at Toronto on Friday Evening. Sutherland's trial had finished, but the sentence had not been pronounced.

The Bank of Upper Canada suspended specie payments on the 5th instant, and the Gore Bank did so on the 10th. An Act passed authorizing the Banks to expand their issues to twice the amount of their paid-up capital. We should have noticed this sooner, but we were in no haste to show that certain persons have thus confirmed the arguments we pressed upon them last summer.

A writer in the last Spectator has given vent to a portion of the spleen which he and others of his party feel for the frustration of their traitorous designs, and for the public observation and censure which they have elicited. That the party should be deeply mortified is natural, and that some of the party have been suspected and subjected to judicial visitations without sufficient cause, is possible; but they have no right to complain, for they know perfectly that the conduct of the party in general, and that of many leading persons among them in particular, has been such as to amply justify all that has been done against them.
