Passed 6th March, 1838. WHEREAS there is reason to believe that WHEREAS there is reason to believe that among the persons concerned in the late treasonable insurrection in this Province, there are some to whom the lenity of the Government may not improperly be extended, on account of the artifices used by desperate and unprincipled persons to seduce them from their allegiance: Be it therefore enacted 8rc., That upon the petition of any person charged with High Treason committed in this Province, preferred to the Lieutenant Governor before the arraignment of such person, and praying to be pardoned for his offence, it shall and may be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of this Province, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, to grant, if it shall seem fit, a pardon to such person in Her Mashall seem fit, a pardon to such person in Her Ma-jesty's name, upon such terms and conditions as may appear proper, which pardon being granted under the Great Seal of this Province, and reciting in substance the prayer of such petition, shall have the same effect as an attainder of the person therethe same effect as an attainer of the person incre-in named for the crime of High Treason, so far as regards the forfeiture of his estate and property, real and personal: Provided always, that in case a pardon shall not be granted upon any such petition, no evidence shall be given of any admission or statement therein contained, upon any trial to be afterwards had.
