THE EVILS OF LITIGATION. What a comment on the state of society in Canada—indeed all over America, is afforded by the multitude of civil suits which come before every court! The demon of litigation seems to preside ever every department of business; the simplest transaction, by a few flouri-hes of a lawyer's quill, becomes involved in a labyrinth of doubt and difficulty; and all affinity ceases between the equity of a claim and the chance of its being established.

Nothing strikes a stranger in one of our courts so much as the manner of eliciting and giving evidence. The most unrestrained licence is taken by counsel in putting what are called leading questions. In many cases the witness is a special pleader on behalf of one of the itigants—with him the blain truth is but a secondary object, if an obthe plain truth is but a secondary object, if an ob-set at all. He feels no embarrassment—evinces no hesitation under the most searching cross-ex-amination, so long as he can see the bearing of the questions: but whenever he loses sight of the probable result of his answer, he affects not to comprehend what is said, and with anusing per-tinacity answers as wide of the mark as he can, and when, after gaining time by means of this atrata em, he perceives that the plain truth would be injurious to the cause of his chent, all the ingenuity of the bar and the bench combined cannot the true it out of him. In vain may the impatient harmster fume, and brilly, and stamp—in vain may the judge admonish, and threaten with commitment; the philosopher in the witness-box maintains the most dogged immobility all the while,—and the recreant truth, after running thro' all the mazes of parishrasis, either marces finally into inmazes of periphrasis, either merges finally into in-explicable equivoque, or escapes altogether by a coup de main. The oath is administered irreverently, and treated with corresponding indiffe ence. The practice, also, of allowing witnesses to hear the examination of each other is often fatal to the cause of truth, and ought at once to be abolished. examination of each other is often fatal to the cause of truth, and ought at once to be abolished. When there is a sinister design on the part of a witness, it is easy to perceive that this practice must aid him materially in its accomplishment; but this is not all—the most ingenuous mind is apt to receive impressions from being brought into contact with others of a different character, that disqualify it for distinguishing truth from error. Every man knows that the strong testimony of another against a fact of which even his own senses were cognizant, will often stagger his confidence in the correctness of impression previously entertained without the slightest doubt. Thus it is, that the really honest witness is often embarrassed and uncertain as to facts to which he would otherwise have had no hesitation in swearing; but the fact is, the kess scrupulous have sworn him out of his senses. By adopting a different course with witnesses, the truth would be made to pass more safely through the mind of the honest man, and the rogue would be disarmed of his principal means of supporting falsebood.—[N'agara Chronicle.]
