The invasion, h wever, proved to be a short one of only a few hours. Bryant, the ascall in-chiel, deeming it prudent to retrace his steps in consequence of a misunderstanding respecting the place of rendez-vous between the invaders a d the rebels on Cald well's Manor, at Henryville, &c. The pirates numbered about sixty and were fully armed, nav-ing with them besides their muskets in their hands hree pieces of cannon and four waggons contain ing arms and ammunition, to deal out to the rebels who had sworn to rise that night and meet them. A loyalist who had crossed to Alburg on Saturday evening was seized by them within the State of Vermont and was kept in confinement until next morning.
