GENTLEMEN,

I thank you for your congratulations on my arrival in Upper Canada.

I am happy to lean that the measure of the reunion of this Province with Lower Canada meets with your entire approbation, and you may be assured that the confidence which the Legislature of this Province has reposed in Her Majesty's Government and the Imperial Parliament, will be used with the single object of promoting the welfate of this portion of her Majesty's dominions.

I trust that the measure now before the Legislature for the disposal of the Clergy Reserves will effect a satisfactory and final settlement of that question. It will afford me the most sincere satisfaction to have contributed to the renoval of one great cause of excitement and discontent in this Province, and thus to have assisted in strengthening the ties with the Mother Country, and perpetuating the existence in this Province of that constitution to which you declare your attachment.

The BRITISH QUEEN had not reached New York st Thursday morning.

THE AMERICAN MAIL .- A month since we entioned the establishment of a daily mail from and to the States, but, we are so ry to say, it has made matters worse instead of better. It does not bring news from New York so late by a day and a haif as we used to have by the tri-weekly mail. Formerly, the mail of Monday night brought us New York papers to Friday evening in summer, and Thursday evening in winter; but now, the same mail brings commonly nothing later than Wednesday morning; once of the evening of that day. It is the same nearly, with the mails on the other days of the week. We get papers, it is true, every day now, but they are not so late by a day, or a day and a half, as used to be bro't by the mail three times a week. It is too bad that on Tuesday mornings, our latest paper from New York should be six days old. As it cannot take this time to travel the distance, it must either stop a long time on some part of the route, or else it goes a long way round in some direction. We beg therefore, that something may be done in the premises, to bring the news a little faster. It is rather provoking that we should go to the expense of a daily mail from Cape Vincent, and yet not have news so late as we had before.

The Mail of last night brought us a paper of Thursday morning, which is some improvement, but still half a day behind what the Mail formerly brought.

Three soldiers deserted from this Garrison last Wednesday night, and after wandering for some time through the woods on Wolfe Island, they supposed that they had reached the States, and went into Hitchcock's tavern, where the cavalry piquet was stationed. They instantly captured the amazed deserters, and brought them back to Kingston.
