

IX.—It is shown that there is evidence of an expectation being entered into on the part of the negotiators, that they would be permitted to extend to the north of the River St. John; that on the contrary, they, in 1773, instructed the negotiators to have, in the north-west angle of Nova-Scotia, established at the western source of the St. John River, and to propose that river, from its source to its mouth, as the boundary between the two countries; and that upon the Government of Great Britain being admitted their proposition, they abandoned it, and agreed to adhere to the Charter of Massachusetts Bay and to the St. Croix River mentioned in it.

ARRIVAL OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL AT TORONTO. From the Toronto Mirror, Sept. 11, 1840. Yesterday (Thursday) about half past two o'clock, Her Majesty's Steam-boat Traveller arrived at the Queen's Wharf, having on board His Excellency, the Governor General. On landing, the Governor General was met by the Corporation, the National Society, and a large concourse of citizens. The 34th and 32nd Regiments formed a guard of honor, dividing to a right and left leaving an opening for him and Sir George Arthur to pass; according to which they passed, and the Governor General was cheered by the multitude in the most gentlemanly manner possible. His Excellency then proceeded to the Parliament House, where the Mayor presented him with the following Address in behalf of the Citizens:—

Extract of a Letter received in Town this morning, from a Gentleman resident in Chatham. "The Governor General arrived here on Wednesday, and was received by the inhabitants as well as in their power. We had bonfires in different parts of the Town, and an illumination. We are all glad that the prospect of what is to be done for the benefit of the United States, which has been made the District Town, which has been expected for some time, and his Excellency has accepted of a survey of the Roads on Round O. on Lake Erie, to take place immediately."
