Since this important question was under discussion in this Province it has rece-ved the sanction of the Imperial Legislature and the flat of our most gracious Sovereign, and has become the Law of the Land—it is therefore the bounden duty of all of us to pay implicit obedience to that Supreme Authority. I shall be one of the first to submit to it; and I trust that the Union will be productive of all those advantages which Her Majesty's Ministers expect, and which every true friend of his country must desire.

If, consistently with your duty, you should again select me as your Representative it will be my endeavor to merit such a renewed proof of your confidence by a conscientious discharge of the task imposed on me.
