MUCH of the wealth, greatness and prosperity of a nation, depends on the successful culture of the soil. Few countries have been known to flourish, during a long time, in which the agricultural interests have been neglected. It may be true, that the commercial interests of some nations are so great, as for a time to overshadow the interests of agriculture, yet, as an occupation for men in general, it can bear no comparison with agriculture. Indeed, among all the occupations of life, however polite or necessary, none can stand in competition with agriculture. And, it is right that it should be so; for, it is the farmer who upholds the hands of community, and strengthens the pillars of the state; notwithstanding the "polite professions," and "delicate employments," in which men are engaged. Where agriculture flourishes, the country grows rich; but where it is neglected, the country's prosperity declines.

Agriculture has been viewed, hitherto, in an unfavourable light, and thought, by many, to be rather a second rate employment; but, it is now being regarded as one of the first, and most honourable of employments. This last view of it, is sanctioned by the wealthy of the land, who are contributing their influence to facilitate its progress.

Parliamentary and Legislative Acts have been, and are being passed, in aid of it—Chemists, Geologists, Naturalists, and Botanists, are adding much to the scientific departments of agriculture.
