In the case which I am going to relate, to which I was led to pay particular attention, and which occurred in the town of Belleville, the Plaintiff was a Constable employed at the hustings during the late election for the county of Hastings, by the Defendant in his capacity of Returning Officer, and who is also Sheriff of the District. The Plaintiff claimed £3 from Defendant, being the amount allowed they state for six days saving during allowed by Statute for six days service, during the election at 10s. per diem. It appeared by the the election at 10s. per elem. It appeared by the evidence, that the Constable having neglected his duty and having been extremely insolent and abusive in his language to the Defendant on the hustings,—the Defendant had discharged him After being discharged and ordered to quit the hustings, the Plaintiff insolently refused to obey, and continued on the hustings throughout the election; for which conduct the Defendant had sufficient authority as Returning Officer, to have com-mitted him; but which he refrained from doing, from the fear that in the then, excited state of the from the fear that in the then excited state of the minds of the people, a riot might have been the consequence. It was not denied by the Plaintiff that the Defendant had offered to pay him for the time he had actually been employed as Constable, which the Defendant believed to be three days, viz. from Monday morning to Wednesday morning or forenoon,—the Defendant being willing to allow him his wages up to the evening of the last mentioned day. The Commissioners, or rather the ruling Commissioner, could not but admit the right of the Returning Officer to discharge his Constable; but some doubt arose, as to the day on which he was discharged. All the witnesses callwhich he was discharged. All the witnesses callwhich he was discharged. All the witnesses called, swore to its being either on the morning of Wednesday or Thursday; the Defendant again stating to the Commission is his readiness to pay the Plaintiff up to the end of the day on which, it might be proved, he was discharged; though an evident loss would thus fall on himself, as the other Constable then employed was fully entitled to remuneration for the greater part of that day.

Though none of the witnesses called could sweat Though none of the witnesses called could swear positively, as to the day, the bulk of the evidence to the last, was decidedly in favor of Wednesday. The Constable of the Court came forward very officiously, as he had not been called as a witness by either party, and offered to swear,—that he "did not hear the Returning Officer discharge the Constable on Wednesday;" though he could not deny, when questioned, that he (witness) was absent from the hustings for a considerable time on that day. The other constable employed by the Defendant on the hustings, who was one of the Plaintiff's witnesses, on being questioned by De-fendant, admitted that he heard him discharge the Plaintiff, but did not hear "the abusive language" used by the latter, though this circumstance fully established by the other witnesses. This lully established by the other witnesses. This last testimony, though it may only be an instance of a most convenient property of certain human ears, which, unlike our common sieves, allow large things to pass, and retain small ones,—will shew how little dependence could be placed on the negative evidence of the Constable of the Court, who no doubt, did his best for his friend; besides earning the constable of the Court, who ing 2s. 6d. as witness, in addition to his other fees. On this most defective evidence, to say the least of it, the "one that hath two gowns" decided,—that as the day on which he was discharged was doubtful, the Plaintiff should have the benefit of that doubt, and therefore decreed, that he should be paid £2 and the costs which amounted to £1 7 6 to be paid by the Defendant!! By this most 7 6 to be paid by the Defendant !!. By this most notable decision the Plaintiff was allowed the benefit of the doubt,—no doubt on account of his praiseworthy conduct in abusing the Returning Officer on the hustings, and again in the presence of this august Court of Requests. And, moreover, as if allowing the Plaintiff his wages up to the morning of Thursday on no evidence at all, was not enough in all consciption—he must be said as not enough in all conscience—he must be paid up doubt in his favor; thus virtually depriving the Constable who took his place of his wages for the greater part of Thursday. Not expecting any difficulty as to the day, the Defendant neglected to call any witnesses to decide that reads any to call any witnesses to decide that point,-which he afterwards found he could easily have done by the positive testimony of one of the Magistrates who was on the hustings when the Constable discharged, and who is ready to swear that Wednesday was the day in question.

The remuneration of witnesses is discretionary with the Commissioners, but must never exceed 2s. 6d. according to the statute; and all of the witnesses being residents in Belleville, it appears somewhat unreasonable, that the very highest rate of remuneration should have been allowed them,—unless it was done in consideration of their rank; one of them being the Clerk of the Peace, another Agent for Crown Lands, and a third Clerk of the District Court. The last ment oned gentleman, I know, never expected to receive any remuneration as a witness; and to the other gentlemen, I should be doing injust ce, were I to suppose them capable of such meanness. Now, as many witnesses must necessarily neglect to claim remuneration, it would be satisfactory to the public to know, what becomes of these sums; whether they become a perquisite of the Clerk, or are returned— reader do not laugh—to the party who has paid them? However this may be, one thing is cer-tain, that on this point, the present system in the Court of Requests is peculiarly liable to abuse, both as to the amount of remuneration allowed to witnesses, and as to the number of witnesses who should be allowed any remuneration at all, where should be allowed any remuneration at an, where cheap law is the object; as it is obvious that with a corrupt Court, the plaintiff who brings the greatest number of suits, and subpænas the greatest number of witnesses, is likely to be the greatest

public opinion. In this little Court, some one of the sapient Judges usually takes the lead, to whom, supported as he sometimes is, by some pretensions to "larning"; or more often, by unconquerable obstinacy and presumption; the others are compelled to yield implicit obedience. Thus he becomes the sole dispenser of justice,—so called,—up to £10; and his coadjutors are degraded to the humble office of yielding a servile acquiescence in his decisions. It would be endless to relate the instances of petty injustice on the part of these natural multiplication of vexatious suits; and can-not fail to create universal contempt towards the individuals who hold them, and general dissatisfaction to the public.
