THE WHITE SLAVES IN OLD ENGLAND

No. 1 .- "Eliza Marshall, lives at Leeds-work. ed at Marshall's factory. Am seventeen years old. Father dead. Sister and self did what we could old. Father dead. Sister and self did what we could to support mother. Have cried many an hour in the factory. Could scarcely get home—sometimes had to be 'trailed' home. I have an iron on my right leg, and my knee is contracted. We rked in great pain and misery. I was straight before. Sister carried me up to bed many a time. The surgeon says it is with long standing at the mill, and that the marrow is quite dried up, and will never be formed again."

No. 2.—"Stephen Binns stated, I have worked in Mr. Marshall's factory. The work produces deformity. It lames the children. The work exacted from the children is all that can possibly bedone. It cannot be done without resorting to flog.

done. It cannot be done without resorting to flog-ging. It is an offence for any one to speak to an-The water used for hot spinning is heated to 110 or 120 degress. The children have almost continually to plunge their hands and arms in that water. The heat of the rooms and the steam almost macerate their bodies, and their clothes are steamed and wet. If they fall sick, they are turned adrift directly—without wages—w thout pro-wision. If a girl complain of ill usage, she is discharged immediately, without any redress. The present system is ruining the rising generation. It is sacrificing the children for a paltry consideration! No. 3.—"Samuel Downe. I was ten years old when I began to work at Mr. Masshali's mill at

when I began to work at Mr. Masscali's mill at Shrewsbury. We began at 5 in the morning and worked till 8 at night. The eagine never stopped, except 40 minutes at dinner time. The children were kept awake by a blow or a box. Very considerable severity was used in that mill. I was strapped most severely, till I could not bear to sit upon a chair without having pillows; and I was forced to lie upon my face in bed at one time, and through that I left. I was strapped on my legs, and then I was put upon a man's back and strapped, and then I was strapped and buckled with two straps to an iron pillar and flogged.—After that the overlooker took a piece of tow and twisted it in the shape of a cord, and put it in my mouth, and tied it behind my head, he thus gagged me. We were thus beaten. We were never allowed to sit down. Young women were beaten as well to sit down. Young women were beaten as well as young men."

No. 4.—" The overlooker examined, says, he

walks around the room with a stick in his hand, and if a child fall drowsy over his work, he touch-their limbs—many from standing too long. It first begins with a pain in the ankle; after that they will ask the overlooker to sit down—but they must not. Then they begin to be weak in the knee—then kneck-kneed—after that their feet furn out—they become splay-footed, and their ankles swell as big as my fists."

We have clipped these fearful pictures from the Cobourg Star, but they were probably extracted by that or some other paper from a report by one of Lord Ashley's Committee's of Inquiry into the State of Manufacturing Establishments. The details given are truly frightful; but let us ask the question what it is that causes these sufferings and cruelties to the unhappy children in the English factories. We answer, the restrictive policy of England, and especially the restriction on foreign corn. Countries which would gladly exchange their agricultural produce for the manufactures of England, being denied a market in that kingdom England, being denied a market in that kingdom for their wheat, are tempted to retaliste by prohibiting the entry of her cottons; they devote their energies to the establishment of manufactures, first to supply themselves, but ultimately for export; England must undersell them in foreign markets or lose the trade; and consequently cheapness of production must be attained, though children became exponents and their little frames be wasted by come cripples, and their little frames be wasted by uninterrupted labour from 5 in the morning till 8 at night. Thus the agricultural interest of Engfand is protected—or rather supposed to be protected, for we think it can be shown that the land owners would not suffer by free trade in corn—at the expense of misery through life and a premature death to thousands upon thousands.

NEFARIOUS TRANSACTION .- In the beginning of the month of April, a vessel named the Montreal Packet, commanded by Captain Stuart, and owned by a Mr. Carson, sailed from Dublin for New York, having on board 196 passengers, bound for the latter place: These passengers had all paid from £4 to £4 10s., besides 4s. 6d. for a doctor, (although we understood these seeds and the seeds as the s we understand there was none on board the vessel) previously to leaving the harbour of Dublin. The Montreal Packet was cleared at the Custom House for New York, and the poor emigrants who embarked in her anxiously anticipated their arrival in that city, in the hope of rejoining friends and relations, from whom they had been long separated. We have mentioned two of the persons by whose representations these poor people were induced to trust themselves, and their little property, on board this vessel. Another agent in the transaction, was Mr. James Millie, of Dublin, the Broker for the vessel. By the joint efforts of these men the passengers were procured, and there is too much rea-son to suspect, that they intended from the begin-ning, to violate the confidence which was implicit-ly bestowed upon them by the Emig ants; for the vessel was kept much to the nothward of the course usually held by vessels proceeding to New York from Dublin, and there seemed to be a studi d design unnecessarily to lengthen the voyage. By the time the vessel was off George's Bank, the provisions of many of the passengers were ex-hausted, and the master then assembled many of them, and told them that as that was the case, in-stead of taking the vessel to New York, he would said for Boston as quickly as possible. To this they eagerly consented, and they were cajoled into the belief that they were proceeding to B stop, until the Montreal Packet reached Patridge Island, off this harbour, on the 26th ult., and was there brought to anchor. On the day of her arrival, A. Wedderburn, Esq. the indefatigable Emigrant Agent in St. John, made himself acquainted with particulars we have just mentioned, and on the 27th addressed a letter to the Mayor, relative to the case of the poor Emigrants, who had been thus deluded to visit our shores. His Worship promptly attended to this communication; the Emigrant Society bestowed every attention to similar representations, and the proper authorities were consulted. off this harbour, on the 26th ult., and was there tations, and the proper authorities were consulted, for the purpose of enabling the victims of this studied fraud, to obtain compensation for the injuries they had sustained. The daily privations to which they were subjected from scanty or insufficient food, were relieved, and all the kind offices which humanity could suggest, were generously rendered by Mr. Wedderburn, by the Society, and by the other persons whom he consulted respecting them. The only feasible plan of bringing the agents in The only leastble plan of bringing the agents in this transaction to a proper sense of the extent of their iniquity, appearing to be to keep the Emigrants on board the vessel, and supply them with provisions, this measure was adopted. By the poor-master, provisions suitable for their wants, have been sent on board the Montreal Vacket, and this cause mill be availabled in in board that when have been sent on board the Montrest Tacket, and this course will be persisted in, in hope that when it is found that the vessel will thus be subjected to an expense of £15 a day to the owner, she will be ordered to New York, her original destination, at the easiest means of evoiding enormous u timate less. The case of one of the parties on board the wessel, we will mention. She is a female, whose husband left Falmouth about a year ago, to go to New York. She was residing in that city, when seeing some advertisement, respecting the Monseeing some advertisement respecting the Mon-treal Packet, she sailed for Dublin, and reaching that port she embarked in this ressel for New York paging \$12 (e.g.). that port she embarked in this ressel for New York, paying £13 for the passage of herself and her two children. At this moment these poor persons are not only prevented from reaching their matural protector, but have been exposed to hardships from want of food and other necessaries, which may probably shorten or embitter their future existence. The sickness of the heart, arising from hope deferred, the violation of all the charities of father, son and brother, which form the circumstances of this case, are common to many, if

not all of those on board the vessel; and the mise ry inflicted by the cruel and nefarious agents by whom these Emigrants have been duped, may be estimated; and we hope, in this city, will be deepcommiserated, and as much as possible relieved.
