The Bombay market for cotton goods is reptesented by the overland mail just arrived, as being extremely dull, and it was only by making the greatest sacrifices that sales could be effected. The lower numbers, 30 and 40, of cotton yarn were in good demand, but the higher numbers entirely neglected. The near approach of the monson occasioned a very general disinclination on the part of the dealers to purchase more goods than was absolutely necessary for the current wants of the market. The shipments of cotton to Great Britain are represented as being on an extensive scale, but few shipments are making to China. Freights to England ranged at £5 5 to £5 10 per ton; exchange, 2s 3-4d at six months.
