PRESENTMENT OF THE GRAND JURY AT THE LATE QUARTER SESSIONS. To Isaac Frazer, Esq., Chairman, and Magistrate of the Court of Sessions assembled.

We, the Grand Jury now assembled, having examined the Gaol and premises, do make the following Report: We examined the Cells, and found them clean and in good order. The prisoners expressed every satisfaction as to their treatment, except that they wished some fire. The air in the Cells appeared somewhat cold, and we would recommend, that if consistent, the complaint might be removed.

ACCIDENT AND LOSS OF LIFE.—The Steamboat Kingston ran into a skiff containing two men and two women, which was crossing the Bay, near the River Trent, by which unfortunate accident, two of the party were drowned, a man and woman. As the night was extremely dark, no blame can be attached to Capt. Harrison.

WE have waited till the latest hour for intelligence from the Magistrates of Ameliasburgh, respecting a daring attempt to rob the house of Daniel Geroy. We have not yet heard from them the particulars. As far as we can learn, the robbers entered the bed room of Mr. Geroy, whom they supposed was then in the possession of two or three hundred pounds. Their design was frustrated by the intrepidity of a young girl living in the family, who followed them into the room with a gun, which she deliberately fired at the robbers, causing them to fly, and it is believed, wounding one of their party.

CAPTAIN JOSEPH WHITNEY, of the Steamer United States, died at Lewiston on the 12th inst. of Typhus Fever. Capt. W. was favourably known to the public, as being one of the oldest commanders on Lake Ontario, having commanded the Canadian Steamer Great Britain for many years, and for the last three years the United States.—[Sackets Harbour Journal.]
