THE TRADE IN SALT .- The Legislature at its late session levied a tax of 2s. 6d. per barrel on American Salt, and reduced the tax on salt imported by sea to 1s. per ten. This is designed to promote the importation of salt from England; but to effect this, the merchants and dealers in the article must take pains to bring it into this market in a better state than has hitherto been done. Great complaints have been made to us respecting the short weight and filthy state of some of the Liverpool salt that has been bought here by our farmers. One person said that he had hardly a barrel or bag that held weight; one barrel was 48 lbs deficient. And much of the salt was unfit for use for any thing but cattle, having been put up in filthy barrels, or otherwise mixed with dirt on its passage. The salt is imported locse in the holds of vessels, and it is probable that our informants had fallen on a lot mixed with sweepings; but we call the attention of the trade, especially the Montreal and Quebec merchants, to the subject, in order that they may bring the article into market in a better state. American salt is all inspected, and if nothing else will do, the Liverpool and St. Ubes salt must also be placed under inspection, so that the purchaser can depend on having a good article and full weight.
