ENGLAND. The British Parliament is at present occupied with a discussion on the appalling and nereasing distress throughout the country, Mr. Wallace having, on Friday, moved as an amendment to the order of the day for going into a sommittee of supply, a series of resolutions to the effect that Parliament should not be proregued without an inquiry being instituted as to the extent of the distress and the best means calculated to afford relief. This has re-opened the question of the corn laws and the leading governments, and there is no knowing when the debate will terminate. Mr. Barnerman has a notice of motion on the books for empowering the Crown to open the ports of Britain to a free apportation of foreign cord, in case of necessity, before the re-assembling Parliament. The bill incorporating the Tattil has passed its third reading in the flouse of Commons, and, as it will probably not be delayed in its passage through the House of Lords, it will soon take its place among the statute laws of the land, along with the Income Tax Act. OVERLAND MAIL-INDIA & CHINA. The fudian mail arrived at Marseilles on the 29th of June. The following telegraphic despatch reached London on Friday. General Polock had joined Sir R. Sale at Jellalabad, reestablishing on his march the authority of Thomas Khan Sulpoora. He was to march on Cabul a soon as he was joined by Colonel Boulton. General England had re-united troops, forced the passes, and joined General Nott at Candahar. Captain M'Kenzie had arrived at Jellalabad, with offers from Akbar Khan to release his prisoners

on conditions. The answer was not known. General Elphinstone died on the 23d of April. The accounts from China are interesting.— On the 18th of March the Chinese, 10,000 or 12,-

one strong tried to retake Ningpo, while another force attacked Chinghae. In both instances they were repulsed with considerable loss,

The details have been received. The mail is despatched from Bombay on the 23d of May, den days earlier than usual, in order to avoid the monsoon. The Chinese were allowed to enter Ningpo without opposition, but upon reaching the market place were attacked on all sides by the British troops, and instandly routed. When they got within one hundred yards of the British guns, a terrific fire of grape and canister was poured down upon them. They fled in confusion, leaving about 250 dead. The 49th regiment was then sent in pursuit, but up to the last accounts had not yet returned. A simultaneous counts had not yet returned. A simultaneous attack had been made upon Chinghae. The encury were again routed. The British did not suffer a single cosualty at either place.

It is said that the Emperor has ordered that the provinces which have the seat of war, shall defear the whole of its expenses. This irrational practice is adopted in relation
o the currency, by the unthinking application
of the rule, that if several kinds of specie be made a legal tender, that which is of least intrin-sic value will drive out of circulation that which is of greater;—or that silver would drive gold out of circulation if both were equally a legal tender. That this rule holds good in England no one doubts; and if other things were equal, it would hold good here; but other things are not equal; and therefore the rule is not applide a legal tender, that which is of least intri cable here.

Where a large amount of capital is constantly unemployed, and capitalists have therefore a choice of what kind of money they will use, or pay out, and what kind they will lay by, or deposit in safe keeping, they will of course use that which is of least intrinsic value, and keep the other. But where a man has no choice in the matter, where every penny he can raise be constant. other. But where a man has no choice in the matter—where every penny he can raize is constantly demanded—where no cartial is unemployed, but if a thousand times more capital were to be had it would all be instantly used—now absurd it is to talk of any kind of coin driving another out of circulation. Here every kind of money is, in constant circulation. No man can keep any back, because every man is constantly compelled to pay out all he has in discharge of his liabilities—the exceptions being too few and inconsiderable to affect the general result.

In England, a man may pick and choose his money, paying out that of least intriusic value, and locking up the rest; but here there is no choice in the case—sovereigns and penny tokens—dollars and shillings, Bank bills and corporation notes, any thing that will pass as money, must all go—with many a heavy sigh, perhaps, but go they must, and all prove too little for the demand. Can a man whose notes are maturing faster than Can a man whose notes are maturing faster than he can take them up, stop to pick out the money he shall pay them in, and reserve the rest? But it is of the coin of the realm that we speak; and if the difference between the intrinsic value of British silver and its nominal rate were greater than it is would not be the coin of the realm that we speak; s nominal rate were greater than it is, it would have no influence in Canada. Money is too scarce here to admit of any being retained, or to

here, giving the one an ample liberty of choice,
and none to the other—will show that the English rule, though just and true there, is totally
inapplicable here. Those who have money here,
and are not pressed by debt, and thus compelled
to pay out all the money they can raise from time
to time, nevertheless find the demand for capital
so great, and the profit of employing it so much,
that they keep no money on hand of any account.
Fast as a few hundred pounds, or even less, are
accumulated or gained, they are put to profitable
use in the improvement of the country. The

Another fallacy with which we have to deal, is that of regulating our public affairs, so as to suit our trade with the United States, as if that was the chief interest to care for, instead of our de-mestic trade. Our first subject of thought and care should be our domestic trade, next our trade with England, and lastly our trade with the Uni-ted States. But this order of things is reversed in some men's minds, and is not attended to in the Currency Act. Our domestic trade—our trade one with another—farmers with each other and with the merchant, mechanic, &c., and these and with the merchant, mechanic, &c., and these again with them and each other, is the principal object to be cared for. To have this rendered casy and beneficial, neither too stringest in its means on the one hand, nor too lax on the other, so that the country can be improved, its latent resources developed, its prosperity secured, and the people well rewarded for their labor, is the latent to be surgical back in the logislative tief end to be pursued, both in the legislative and executive departments of public business, leaving our foreign trade to take its subservient and secondary place. If it could be shown that any proposed measure—that the making British a legal tender to any amount, would raise ate of exchange on New York, for instance, -would have some unfavorable effect on foreign trade, that is a consideration that can have but little weight, if the supposed measure promoted our domestic trade. The assumed or proved ill effect must be taken as an incident of foreign trade, and compensated by a sufficient additional price, as, in fact, all such incidents are. It would be an unbeard of anomaly that the whole mass of

the community should suffer for the interests of half a dozen foreign traders; or that the wible of a people's public and domestic affairs should be a people's public and domestic affairs should be regulated by a part of their external trade and sacrificed in a vain attempt to build up that on the people's ruin. This would not be dreimed of even in Holland, which has depended nore upon external trade than any other people of the present day. It would be better to be without the American trade, than that the whole of the Province should be without money. Instead of imposing restrictions, every facility should be given for the full employment of such capital as we can command, for all is far too limited for the wants and resources of the Province.
