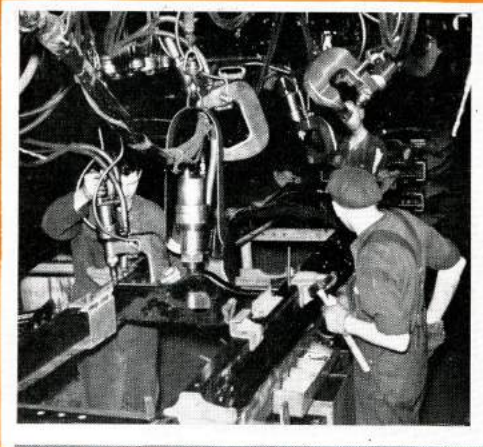

RELIABILITY

Message from General Sir Harold R. L. G. Alexander, Commander of Allied ground forces in North Africa. Broadcast at Ceremony marking completion of the five hundred thousandth Canadian mechanized unit, held at General Motors, Oshawa, June 19, 1943.

"I send greetings and thanks to Canadian Workers on behalf of all ranks under my command. One of the greatest supply problems of the war was that of maintaining the 8th Army crossing countless miles of desert tracts between Alamein and Tripoli. Through 1,200 Miles of Mud and Shell Fire Canadian Vehicles Meet the Test of Battle



"Somewhere in the Mediterranean theatre," a Chevrolet Field Artillery Tractor rolls toward the battle lines. General Motors' Oshawa-built war vehicles are serving on practically all United Nations' fighting fronts.

OSHAWA—After nearly 1,200 miles of battle-front driving through Sicily and Italy, a member of Canada's 1st Anti-Tank Regiment has written to General Motors in praise of the Chevrolet Field Artillery Tractor—or "gun tower" as Gunner W. E. Adams, R.C.A., calls it.

In speaking of the vehicle's "grand performance", Gunner Adams, now back in England, writes: "I have just recently returned from the battlefield after being on both the Sicilian and Italian invasions. While in Sicily, I drove 443 miles, and in Italy 743 miles, and this, you must remember, was cross country, through mud—over hills of every description—and I

can quite easily say without hesitation that you and the people of Canada are doing a grand job.

"I have driven through heavy and constant shell fire, through machine-gun fire, mortar fire, and every time your car has brought our gun and crew safely to our destination. Not once did your grand and most powerful Chevrolet gun tower let us down.

"The grand job you are doing back there certainly saved my life more than once and to the staff of General Motors of Canada, I am most grateful."

HORSEPOWER AND FIREPOWER ON PARADE

Display of War Weapons Produced by General Motors for Army, Navy and Air Force

Oshawa, May 18.—20,000 Oshawans visited the Oshawa Arena in May to witness the "Arms for Victory" display put on by General Motors in aid of the Fourth Victory Loan. The arena was suitably decorated with flags of the United Nations and Victory Loan posters and an exhibition of many of the war products from General Motors plants in Canada. Excellent music was provided by the City of Oshawa Band. Notable in the display of General Motors "Arms for Victory" was the amazing horsepower and firepower represented by the instruments of war produced in GM factories for the three armed forces. The effect of the exhibit was to impress the people with the fact that this is above all a war of machine power. Over forty members of the press saw Victory Loan and General Motors films that were features of the show. W. A. Wecker, General Manager of General Motors, after outlining Canada's amazing war-expansion programme, told the press that in his opinion "Canada has done as fine a job as any of the United Nations, starting as we did with practically no experience. Our record of achievement is an enviable one." As a display of GM war products, the show was noteworthy for bringing together for the first time the output of five Canadian factories and giving the employees an opportunity to appreciate the scope of General Motors' effort.

GENERAL MOTORS TO START MANUFACTURE OF PLANE FUSELAGE

OTTAWA, Aug. 28.—(BUP)—General Motors of Canada Ltd. soon will begin the manufacture of warplane fuselages under sub-contract from the De Havilland Aircraft Co. of Canada, the Department of Munitions and Supply announced on Thursday night.

The work will be undertaken at General Motors' Oshawa plant, where necessary facilities are being installed. Production is expected to get under way in January or February of next year.

The work will involve the employment of a large number of workers.

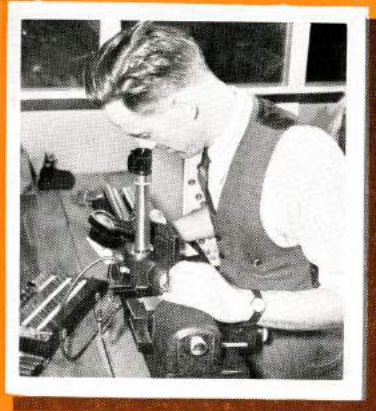

DEADLY GUNS NOW MADE AT ONTARIO PLANT

WINDSOR, Sept. 2.—The Browning machine gun is in production here in the ultra-modern plant of Border Cities Industries Ltd., a subsidiary of General Motors of Canada Ltd. Secrecy was imposed while the big factory was in production, but it is now revealed to 930 employees, principally girls specially trained on precision machinery, are working out "one of the most destructive arms in the armament program of the United Nations."

The machine gun is the keynote in their production operations and there are some 1,800 which number approximately 1,000 in the district before. Oshawa, April 26.—The Suggestion Plan in operation in the plants of General Motors of Canada, Limited, at Oshawa, Windsor and Regina, has so far netted employees \$20,000 in Victory Bonds and War Savings Certificates as awards for ideas leading to improvement in manufacturing methods and other operations, it was announced today.

The Suggestion Plan has been in operation over two years and during that time five maximum awards of \$750 each in Victory Bonds have been made. During the 1944 period 2,006 suggestions for improvements in operations were received of which 513 were adopted for an average of 25.6 per cent. The average award amounted to \$21.39.

It has been an enviable record, and I hope you will convey my deep appreciation to all concerned for what they accomplished.

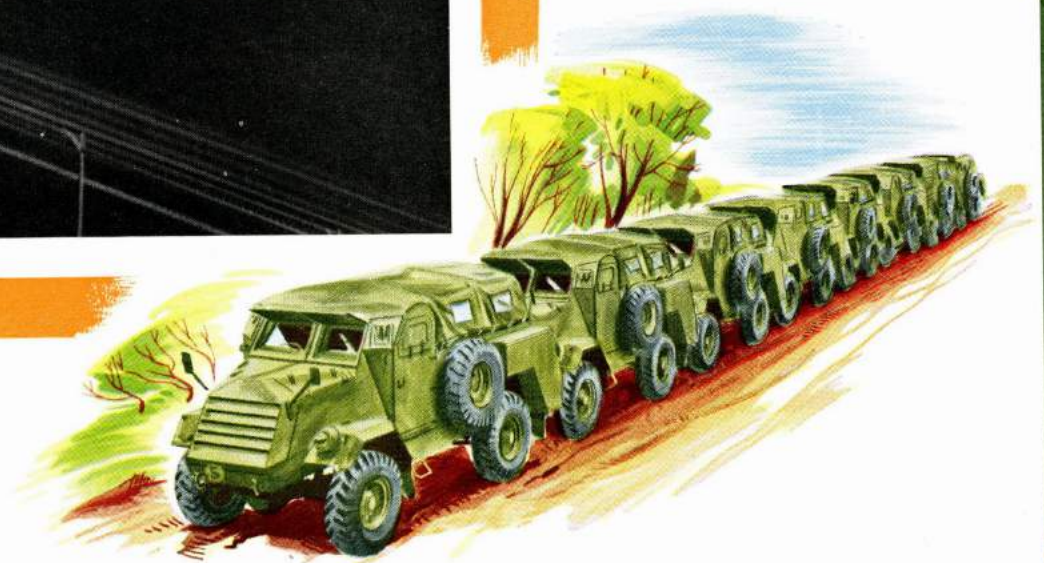
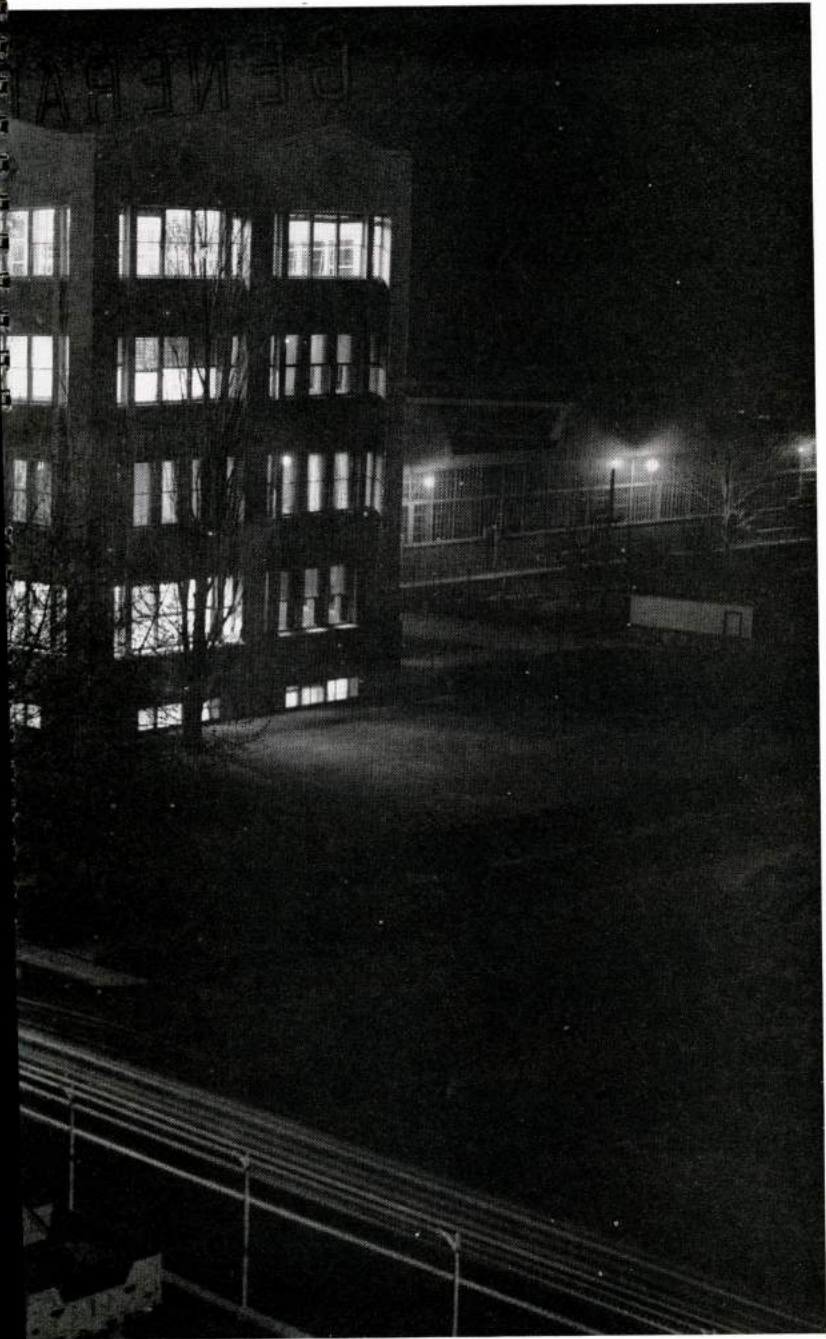
