A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Scott act association will be held in French's hall, Brockville, on Friday, October 3rd, at 1 p.m. A full attendance is requested as business of importance is to be brought up for consideration. A cordial invitation is extended to the vice-presidents of the different municipalities in the counties as well as any others interested in the

movement. The petitions for the submission of the Scott act in these united counties will be deposited in the sheriff's office on Saturday, October 4th. The generalsecretary is new engaged checking them over before depositing, and while we have not the exact figures to hand as we go to press, still we find that enough signatures have been received from a little more than half the municipalities to foot up the required number. There will probably be nearly 5,000 signatures
