The majority in favor of the Scott Act in Brome county was 485, in Lanark county 414, in Kent county 2,029, and the City of Guelph 169. Lennox and Addington gave a majority of 47 in favor of the Act. The liquor men confidently expected a majority of 500 against the Act.
