Slaughter of Fish. To show the destructive agency of nets among fish, we cite the result of a capture made last week at Black Lake, back of Morrinstown. The net was a large one, and when taken up was found to contain 1,000 bull heads, 150 black and Oswego bass, 55 pike and a whole host of small fish. The fish were liberated, and the net burned by detectives.

His feats were exceedingly difficult and were performed with astonishing ease and grace. Other good features of the entertainment were the character songs and dances by several members of the troupe, and the eieg dancing by the little brothers Moore. Upon the whole Lewis & Wardrobe's show is far ahead of the average travelling variety troupe.

B & W Railway. During the past week the contracts for grading and masonry have been let for a large portion of the road from Brockville to Westport. Mitchell & Robinson, have secured the contract for the 3 first sections, extending from Brockville to near Farmersville. One of the firm arrived in Brockville on Monday and will commence operations at once. They call for 300 men and 100 teams, Sections 4 & 5 extending from a point a little east of Farmersville to Delta creek, a distance of 12 1/2 miles has been awarded to R & P. Mitchell & Co., of Ottawa. Section 6 from Delta about 6 miles has been let to P. C. Swaathedell & Co., of New York. On all these sections work will commence at once. Boarding shanties were commenced at Philipsville yesterday; and 20 teams left here this morning to bring 300 navvies to different points along the line. Everything points to an immediate commencement of work along the entire line between Brockville and Westport. We propose making some comments about the locating of the line in our next issue.

Gannaque Water Power Company.

THE AWARDS FOR DAMAGES.

Judge McDonald to day gave his award for damages caused to land-owners by the raising of the outlet of Charleston Lake, a work undertaken by the water power company in order to provide storage and furnish a sufficient supply of water to drive the machinery at Gannaque during the season of low water. The sums awarded are as follows:—

In addition to this sum, settlements were effected between the parties concerned to the amount of \$4,874.35 without going before the judge, so that the total amount the company will have to pay for damages will be \$14,149.55. The cost of survey and other expenses will make the total cost of the improvement about \$20,000. In the cases which came before the judge no order was made for costs, so that each party will have to pay their own. —Recorder of 14th inst.

Brockville is preparing for a trade procession on Dominion day.

Not Portage has been half destroyed by fire for the third time. A waterspout burst over Marshall, N.C., on the 8th inst. Houses fell before the advancing flood, cattle were swept away and drowned, and crops were destroyed.
