Cultivation of the Peach. Mr. J. F. Taylor, of Michigan, who has given great attention to the cultivation of the peach, writes the Horticulturist of that State five rules each on the condition of failure and success in the cultivation of the fruit. Failure comes from the follow-

1. A wee soil, or one that from any cause holds water around the roots of the tree. whether the land is situated high or low. 2. Excessive fertility where the trees are young, whether it be secured in the natural condition of the soil or by the ingenuity of

3. Severe cutting back of the young growth each year, thus dwarfing the tree and robbing it of much natural vitality 4. Allowing trees to overbear and thus exhaust their vitality by a a single crop of

5 By deficient and improper cultivation. Conditions of success are stated as fol-

1. An elevated location that is not sub ect to late frosts in the spring or early

2. A warm and moderately fertile soil that is well drained by nature. Artificial drainage may prove successful, but its utility has not been fully demonstrated in this

3. Thorough outtivation, without manure, until the trees come into bearing, then combine the two so as to supply all the depletion produced in the soil by growth of trees and fruit.

4. Never let a tree overbear. 5. Continue cultivation until the close of the dry season every summer even if it continues until September.

It should be added that the summer cultivation should be only such as to maure a perfect surface tilth of the soil to assist in conserving the moisture as much as pos-
