We see by the *Recorder* that the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Farmersville Plank Road Co. is to be held at Brockville on the 13th of next month. Would not this be a good time for a deputation to wait upon the shareholders and demand that the road be put in proper condition, and in case of the neglect or refusal of the company to put the road in passable order, to present that petition to the County Judge which was prepared last spring? Taking the past as a criterion, we need not expect any repairs or improvements upon the road excepting such as are wrought from the company by the force of public opinion. Express drivers and others who are in a position to know unhesitatingly affirm that the road between this village and Unionville is, and has been for a number of years, the worst stone road in these counties. So long as the people uncomplainingly submit to using such a road, just so long will the directors refrain from spending more than a few dollars a year to patch up the worst sloughs, in order that the shareholders may boast that they are getting eight per cent. on their investment.

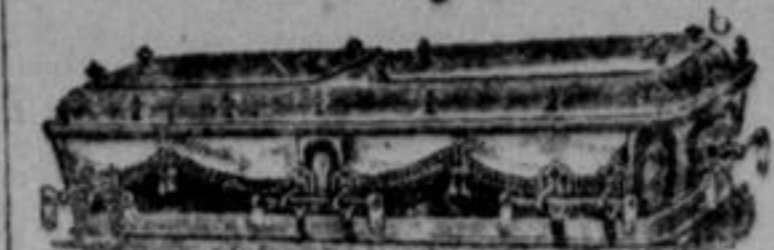
