ANNIVERSARY.
The anniversary entertainment of this school, on Christmas night, was a great success. The church was crowded, and the proceeds of the admission were amounted to over \$100. In his opening address, Mr. D. Fisher, the popular and efficient superintendent, announced that the school had enjoyed phenomenal success during the year. The teaching staff was very efficient, and every effort had been made to improve the school. There was however ample room for more active workers. The attendance during the year had increased to over 100 pupils. The total expenditure of the school for the year had been \$114.75, and the total receipts, including the balance from previous years, \$131.30. Of this sum \$48 was received from collections taken up in the school. An interesting feature of the programme was the cantata entitled "The Child of Judah," which was performed in a manner creditable to the choir and to the leader, Mr. D. Fisher. Miss Johnson sang the soprano solo, Miss H. Stone, the alto; Mr. C. Fisher, the baritone; and Mr. Porter the bass. Several interesting choruses by the infant class were among the best numbers in the programme. The recitation in character by Miss M. Stone was deservedly applauded. Numerous

recitations and dialogues were given in excellent style by the scholars, and we are glad to mention that our space is too limited to allow of mentioning each individual number. The entertainment was one of the best given in Farmersville.

A CLEVER CAPTURE.
Our readers will doubtless remember our account of the daring burglary of the store of Moulton & McKay, of Delta, a few weeks ago. No trace of the burglars was found for some time, although suspicion pointed to a couple of railway navvies who boarded in the village, and who left about the time of the burglary. Acting upon this suspicion constables Robinson and Soper started out on the trail of the supposed thieves. Perth, Smith's Falls, and all the small villages along the new Air-Line Railway, were visited, but nothing was learned of their whereabouts until they reached Komptville, where a cap which one of the parties had sold was found. Following up the clue obtained the detectives finally located their men at South Finch, on the new railway works. After a sharp tussle the men were secured and gave their names as Pat. Mullen and Jas. Smith. They were brought before Squire Sellick, of Komptville. A quantity of clothing and several caps were found in their possession. The prisoners were at once conveyed to Brockville jail, and the stolen property was placed in charge of the proper officials. An inspection of the articles found was made by one of the men, who fully identified them; especially a fur cap, which had been ordered for a customer and had their private mark upon it. Constables Soper and Robinson are deserving of great credit for the plucky manner in which they followed up the trail and secured the burglars and a good share of the stolen goods.

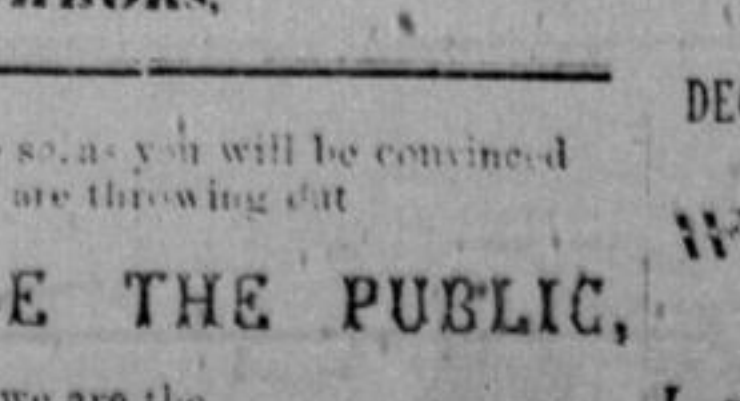
