But perhaps the most memorable occasion was the special service on the 21st of March 1855, when a fast day was appointed by Royal proclamation, and special prayer was made for a blessing on " the just and necessary war (the Crimean) in which we are engaged." The sermon on that occasion was preached with marvellous ele quence by Canon Melville. It will be observed that only the House of Commons attend the service at St. Margaret's, which is their parish church. The House of Lords are supposed to attend Divine worship at the more aristocratic Abbey of Westminster, close by.
