In boring wells for water, the further down the operator gets the more brackish th water becomes, and at one point on the Red River, thirteen miles above Winnipeg a spring of brine runs out the year round never freezing even in the coldest weather. But a still more remarkable indication that salt may be obtained in paying quantities in this very neighborhood is, found on the north bank of the White Mud River, where, at a point near / Woodside, brine of considerable strength bubbles up in such quantities it will be a great saving to the


