An application was made to the Minister of Customs, by Mr. Wood, M. P., to admit engines for use on the B. & W. R. R. free of duty, on the ground that they were purchased before the first of July last. As in the case of similar applications from other quarters, the Minister decided that the engines were liable to imposition of the duty, as they had not been imported before the date named.
