**MAGISTRATES HOLD COURT.**

**A Wage Case.**—Sent to the gaol for 14 days for non-payment of wages.

**Dismissed.**

The usual quiet of our little town was disturbed on Saturday last by the appearance in the village of a large number of bright-eyed, well-dressed gentlemen who wear after their names the honorable appendage of J. E., and the legal functionaries eager to display their fund of lore, made up a fair sized crowd as they wended their way to the town hall to dispose of the numerous and knotty questions that required unravelling.

**SUED FOR WAGES.**

The first case on the docket was that of James Lovingson v. Andrew Morrison, both of the township of Hastings. The plaintiff sued for amount of wages claimed to be due, amounting to \$27.65. The deft. claimed a non suit on the grounds that the plt., by not putting in his full time, had failed to fulfill his agreement, and that he had never asked for a settlement.

The plt., on being examined, said that he had worked for deft. the full time; less half a day, and that he had demanded a settlement.

Deft. was sworn, and said that he had kept a cash account of the time worked, which backed two days or more of the specified period. He also put in a counter account of \$1 for use of horse and buggy drawing home for plaintiff, and \$10 for carrying some provisions, &c. He testified that he had never refused the pltf. money when he asked for it, and was prepared to settle at any time.

After consideration on the justices ordered that pltf. receive full amount claimed, each party to pay their own costs. The decision regarding costs was given on the ground that the pltf. should have made a demand for settlement, before entering an action.

**CLAUNDERED HORSES.**

The next case was that of Abel DeWolfe v. Jas. Keating. It was the outcome of the glandered horse case referred to in the Recorder two weeks ago, in which the magistrates ordered that the animals should be killed and buried on or before the 10th of October. The order had not been obeyed, and that one of the horses had been traded by Jabez Bullis to John E. Brown, of Delta. Berney had DeWolfe summoned to show cause why the horses had not been destroyed.

Judge Scott deposed as to the order of the court.

DeWolfe declined to admit whether the horses were destroyed or not.

Jabez Bullis was called, who said he had not received any horses from DeWolfe; did not know of his own knowledge that deft. had glandered horses; traded horses often, sometimes in the night, and did not know the name of the man from whom he got the horse that he had traded to Berney.

Abel DeWolfe testified that he was the horse since the day of his trial, and did not know anything about them except from hearsay; did not know what had become of them.

Judge Scott deposed as to the statement that he had heard that the horses were alive and had given orders to have them destroyed forthwith. He went and got DeWolfe to identify the horses after they were killed. He ordered them to be buried.

The pltf. not wishing to press the case, the matter was settled by DeWolfe agreeing to pay plaintiff costs had been incurred.

**ASSAULT CASE.**

The next on the docket was the assault case of Henry Hawkins v. Grand Wittse. This was a case arising out of a disturbance at a Salvation Army meeting on Sunday evening, October 26th.

Henry Hawkins, the complainant, testified that he was the father of Wm. Hawkins, who he said was assaulted by the deft. as he was coming down the stairs in the town hall. He saw the deft. poke his arm in the side of his elbow, as he passed him on the stairs, the blow staggering him some. When a few steps further down the stairs deft. turned and struck to his own right side with his right hand, and said "I'll see you boys should not get in my way."

William Hawkins gave similar testimony to his father, as to the poking with his elbow by the deft. In cross-examination he said he did not see the deft. strike Henry Hawkins, but he saw him strike Wm. Hawkins.

**FARMERSVILLE HIGH SCHOOL.**

Report of the Head Master. The School in a Flourishing Condition.

To the CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF SCHOOL COMMISSIONERS, FARMERSVILLE:

Gentlemen,—I beg leave to submit the following report of the Farmersville High School for the months of September and October, 1888:

In comparing the attendance of October of last year with that of the same month of this year, I find that there is an increase of 17 this year. The large and regular attendance, together with the interest taken by the pupils in their work, is very encouraging to the teachers. The classes taking the Teachers' Course and University Matriculation are very promising; and the junior division of the First Form is one of the brightest that I have had during seven years' experience in High School work.

Nearly all the geranium plants that were set out in front of the school building have been killed. I have been given one of them during the winter and return them in the spring. In my register I have kept a list of the persons to whom plants were given, the number and the kind of plants.

More books are required for the school routine. A clock is a necessity for punctuality and regularity in school work. There are no cases of water standing on the steps in the two lower rooms. I respectfully call the attention of the Board to these requirements.

For the successful carrying out of Graduation Exercises this year, it will be necessary for you to consider ways and means. I would suggest that a committee be appointed from the Board to act with teachers in preparing a programme that will do our High School credit.
