At the Council's Council last week Deputy Reeve Berney presented the petition praying for the incorporation of our village and for the change of name to Athens. The document was signed by 68 freeholders and 61 householders. Mr. Geo. Nash's census report was read, showing a present population of 512. The boundaries of the new municipality were shown on a plan drawn by S. J. Saunders, C.E. Excludes of streets, the territory embraces 480 acres. A by-law giving effect to the prayer of the petition was introduced, and after the usual formalities was finally passed. Mr. J. P. Lusk was appointed returning officer to hold the election for the first Athens Council. The nomination is fixed for the 31st inst., and the election for the following Monday.
