The Rev. J. Wilson, B.A., preached a temperance sermon in the Methodist Church last Sunday evening. The discourse was a scholarly and thoughtful effort, and took the ground that the general teaching of Scripture was prohibitory of the use of alcoholic drinks as a beverage.

Miss Betsey Jane Moore, sister of Mrs. Blackburn and of Mr. G. W. Brown, of this place, died at her residence, Manson, Calhoun Co., Iowa, on the 5th inst. Deceased was born in this country on May 14th, 1842, and was married on March 17th, 1859. Her five children are living.

We understand that Mr. Malcolm Halliday has purchased a half interest in the Gordon Woolen Mill. The new firm have ordered several new and improved machines for working wool into cloth, and intend, as soon as spring opens, to put the machinery in the very best of order, and will make a strong bid for public patronage.

A large force of men have been shoveling out the snow drifts on B. & W. During the past five or six days. On Sunday night a heavy freight train arrived here from Lynn. The line was this morning clear of snow from Westport to a point three miles west of Athens, and it is expected that regular trains will be running again to-morrow.

On Sunday evening last, Rev. Stearns Tighe, of Lansdowne Front, preached in Christ Church on "The Wines of the Bible." There was a large attendance, and the reverend gentleman's discourses received the undivided attention of all. Mr. Tighe is opposed to the present agitation in favour of the Scott Act, and, in brief, to any law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor.

A painful death occurred here last Tuesday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Wright Sheldon left their home in Plum Hollow in the enjoyment of their usual health, intending to do some shopping in Athens. After dusk Mrs. Sheldon came out of Mr. Thompson's store and got into the sleigh. As she was about to fall over in the street, the sufferer was immediately taken to the residence of his father, Mr. Jas. Kilborn, and a medical man sent for; but she died in a few moments after the attack. The very sudden and sudden event cast a gloom over the deceased's large circle of acquaintances in Plum Hollow and Athens. Mrs. Sheldon was in the 25th year of her age.
