W. G. T. Note.
The following extract from an eloquent address by a Spanish gentleman, Señor Victor M. Gorbea, a member of the Order of Royal Templars, known and worthy of constant and forcible recollection:—
"As we are Templars, as also are we warriors; and all know our enemy alcohol. Our banner reads 'Forward,' and our motto is 'Prohibition.' Our war is an honorable one of a determination; we stand as champions of an honorable cause, and to be successful we must unite our strength and work for humanity."
"Who can tell how many homes have been dishonored by the evil work of intemperance? No one suffers more from its evil effects than the drunkard's wife. She is bound in wedlock to one who is the destroyer of her happiness, and yet with true wife's love she will do all in her power to endure or drive away the evil that brings such terrible and fatal consequences to her and her children. In my belief a drunken husband or father is many times over a thief; he robs himself of his health and the love of his dearest one, his family of its peace and tranquility of life, and would otherwise be the services of a useful citizen."
"Intemperance allows no purified atmosphere, for its breath is pollution; it pours no wealth into the homes of the poor, and it converts the food of the rich into poison. The ladies must aid us with the winning and gentle influence of their sex in this noble and glorious work. We have to labor in unison for the extermination of an evil which invades every department of social life, and we must be united in our demand and work, to see that the maker and seller cease forever from their baneful occupation."
"We know that the cause in which we are engaged will prevail in the world, but my belief is that to popularize sobriety and virtue we must urge the truths of Prohibition upon those who need uplifting. It is the fruitful use of sympathy and encouragement toward those who need uplifting."
"Brethren, fear not the cold greeting of the world, or the sneer of our fashionable friends. We have to conquer the iron of the egotistic, the laugh of the foolish, the scorn of the ignorant proud, and the sneer of the selfish. But in spite of all these we shall yet win the victory."
