British Troops to Oppose Boer South Africa

SOME FIGHTING EXPECTED.

A London cable says: In reply to a question in the House of Commons today in regard to the reported Boer "trial" being prepared for the invasion of Mafeking, Lord Lansdowne, and other South African territory for the purpose of establishing the so-called "Republic of the North," Lord Lansdowne stated that the Boer Government has not yet decided whether to proceed with the invasion of Mafeking on June 1st and to proceed to the Republic of the North.
