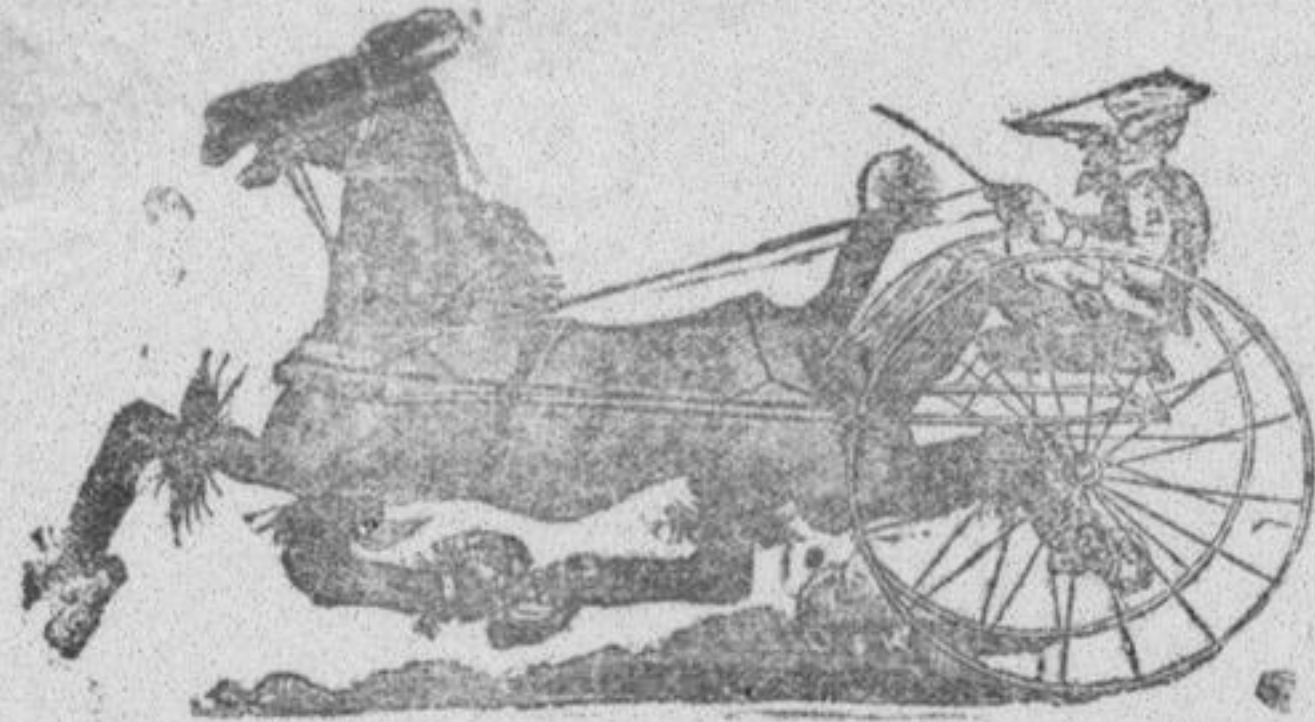

Messrs. T. Berney and C. Rowsom have shipped three car loads of grain from Athens station, and have sufficient for two more ready for loading.

Last Saturday two men passed through Elgin with a load of venison—12 deer in all—which was in prime condition. They report plenty of snow and cold weather up north.

Fred Abbott, of Iroquois, has in his possession a rather curious and rare article belonging to the vegetable kingdom. It is fifteen cubit long, all good and solid, varying in size from a large cabbage to a small turnip, all springing from the same root.

The Northwest Territories election issue was whether the Prohibition law in the Territories was to be continued or liquor license granted. The result was a complete defeat of the Prohibitionists, only two of their candidates, as far as can be ascertained, being elected.

On Thursday last the woods were literally alive with hunters. Even the islands of Charleston were searched for the elusive partridge. High and low, on water and on land, the gunners "gamed" for game, but an excellent appetite, and that only, is what the great majority brought home.

Thanksgiving day was observed in Athens by service in the churches, and in the evening in the Methodist church the Missionary Auxiliary gave an entertainment. The services were well attended, and a very large audience gathered in the evening, when the program as advertised last week was presented and delighted those present.

It is reported that a son of Charles Hallowell was drowned in Crosby Lake on Friday evening last. He went from home across the lake to Hallowell's and started to return home paddling the punt with an oar standing up. The boat and oar and his son were found on Saturday floating on the lake. Diligent search has been made since but so far no trace of the young man has been found. Crosby Lake is about four miles north of Westport.

Ernest Albert McDonald is perhaps the most widely known private citizen in Toronto. He is sometimes called the Baron of Chester but is often called names that sound like look so well in print. The Eclipse. An unusually large number of our readers fixed their minds upon things about on Sunday evening. The astronomical phenomenon of a total eclipse of the moon was fixed for that date and hour, and it was looked for with eager expectancy. The full moon rose at a quarter to five o'clock and then had been fifteen minutes in the penumbral shadow of the earth. At 6 o'clock the moon entered the dark central shadow and at 7 o'clock was totally eclipsed. At 8 o'clock commenced moving off and at 10 1/2 minutes shone forth with increased brilliancy.

A meteoric display is announced for the 27th inst., when there will be a shower of shooting stars. On two occasions in the past the displays on this date have been particularly brilliant and noteworthy.

Death of Rev. Wm. Brown. One of the oldest of the pioneer Episcopal Methodist ministers of Canada, died at his residence in the village of Iroquois on Monday, Nov. 16th. The funeral will be held in the Methodist church at that place at 10 a. m. to-morrow (Wednesday).

The Rev. gentleman was born on the old Brown homestead, near Elgin, in this county, and was in his 77th year at the time of his death. He entered the ministry of the old M. E. Church when quite young and was always one of its most prominent members. Just before his decease he was appointed pastor of the Episcopal church in Iroquois where he has since resided. During his many years of ministry he was stationed on nearly every circuit in the old Bay of Quinte district and was probably one of the best known preachers in eastern Ontario. His brothers, Rufus, Cephas and George passed down over the B. & W. yesterday to attend the funeral.
