View of Sunset Bay, Charleston Lake.



The above electrotype is designed to illustrate a portion of Canada's Coming Summer Resort, Charleston Lake. With a shore line of over ninety miles, nearly one hundred islands and scenery unsurpassed by any fresh water lake in the world, it is no wonder that all who have ever visited Charleston Lake would be loath to leave it. Its waters are purer than those of the St. Lawrence and its shores are rocky and precipitous with the exception of occasional bays. The islands of Charleston Lake afford a desirable retreat during the sultry days of July and August, for the weary and careworn tourists who annually love to spend a few days or weeks at their purse or inclinations may direct. The summits of many of these rock-bound islands are crowned with picturesque summer residences, which impart an air of comfort and rest to the visitor. Some fifteen or twenty of these cottages are now to be seen on the islands and frontiers overlooking the water; while the large and cozy Cedar Park Hotel furnishes accommodation for over 100 guests. Viewed from a geological standpoint the shores and islands of Charleston Lake are of paramount interest to the antiquarian and geologist. Its rocks are the oldest known to science, and indeed according to the theory of the most able students of nature, it lies on the very outskirts of the first narrow belt of land that rose above the waters of the ocean in the far remote era of the past. Adopting this conclusion, what a subject for contemplation is presented to the mind! The visitor to the shores of Charleston Lake is standing upon the oldest land on this green earth—upon land which is hoary with age, compared with that of the oldest parts of the Old World; upon the first bare, black rock that rose above the waters of the Atlantic, long ages before a single foot of Europe had seen the light of day. The writer has seen white sails gleam on the beautiful Rideau lakes; he has viewed the enchanting scenery and grandeur of the Thousand Islands; and passing down through the Canadian Rapids and up the majestic Hudson; but the scenery, the sublimity, and soul-stirring power of Charleston Lake far surpasses in power to move the best and deepest feelings of our natures. Early next spring we purpose taking photographs of the principal points of interest, as well some of the cottages and have electrotypes made from them for insertion in the columns of the Reporter. These will help those who have never yet visited our beautiful lake to form some idea at least, of a few of the many attractions of our summer resort.

Editor Reporter:

DEAR SIR.—I notice in your last issue an article over the signature of Mr. H. H. Arnold, referring to school matters in reply to the Reporter. I hope you will allow me a small space in your very esteemed paper to say a few words. As one who takes a deep interest in school matters, I cannot allow this opportunity to pass (in making to myself) without taking notice of some intimations made, probably referring to myself in Mr. Arnold's article. When I alluded to the irregularities, (as I saw them) in the school board in the matter of expenditure, at nomination day, I did so in the interest of the people, principally from what I saw in the Reporter a short time before, that there might have been hoodling in the school board and village council. Feeling somewhat skeptical from past experience in such matters, I felt it my duty to make some enquiries into the matter and I was in hope some explanation and a published statement in detail would have been given to the people before this. After all that has been said and written on the subject, still there appears a determination to withhold such from the public, and if it were done, it would no doubt quiet any feeling of unrest that exists. It is a matter of great importance that our high school district be kept intact, and if any person or persons are (in my opinion) responsible for the agitation in the matter of dissolution, this responsibility rests with the favorites of the incorporation and the change of the name of the village, as well as a distrust that has arisen in the minds of the township people in the management of the finances of the school. Now, Sir, while I was a reeve of the township years ago, I in connection with the reeves of Kempsville and Gainsboro, succeeded through the counties court in securing for a high school district for Athens the Township of Bear of Youngs and Escott, Kitley, Bastard, Bear of Leeds, and the Grosby's. If I remember correctly, the understanding with the council, was that there would be no expense other than the expense of conducting the school for a time at least. I informed the trustee board of this arrangement, but what did they do? They at once ignored the understanding and engaged at once to erect a new high school building to cost somewhat near \$10,000 to be added upon the district the first year. As might be expected, it aroused the indignation of the reeves interested and at the next meeting of the council they repealed the by-law, and a feeling of distrust has existed ever since towards the trustee boards, hence the refusal ever after to consider the matter of high school district for Athens school. So much for the discretion and wisdom of the trustees after that date, and as for the action of the continuous boards since, I have nothing to say here, but must conclude that the present board with our new member and excellent citizen Mr. Arnold, be being associated with both trustee boards we will look forward with great confidence that there will be hereafter no irregularities to complain of. As our schools have been under the management of the united boards, so in referring to one affected the other, and as they are now separate and distinct, I think it will give better satisfaction to all concerned. Dear Yonge & Scott Council.

The council met at the call of the reeve at the town hall, Athens, on Saturday evening Feb. 20th, 1892, at 7 o'clock. Members present: J. B. Saunders, reeve; T. C. Brown, John Mackie, Wm. H. Osborne, and Fred S. Hayes, councillors. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

A petition signed by 287 ratepayers of the township praying that the township, except a part of Union School Section No. 6 which is in the limits of the township, be withdrawn from the High School District, was presented to the council.

Geo. P. Wight and Fred W. Scovill, auditors, were given orders on the treasurer for \$4 each.

On motion, the petition for withdrawing a portion of the township from the High School District was received, and that by law be passed at the next meeting of the council in accordance with the prayer of the petition and the clerk was instructed to give the proper notices in accordance with Section 291 of the Municipal Act.

Council adjourned until Saturday March 5th 1892, at 2 o'clock p.m. R. E. CORRELL, Clerk.
