AWARDED \$1,000. A Female Girl Obtains Substantial Damages for Breach of Promise.

The case of Moorehead vs. McGruer, for \$2,000 damages for breach of promise tried at Brockville last week resulted in a judgment of \$1,000 for the lady's satisfaction.

The plaintiff is a seamstress residing with her parents, and the defendant a married man. The date of the engagement was back to 1889.

In August 1889, the two were engaged, though McGruer's first wife's relatives did not want him to wed again at an early date.

He was agreeable to marry a year later. The last visit his first wife's death. The last visit was on Feb. 17th, 1890, and on March 11th married another. Miss Moorehead said: "The engagement between Mr. McGruer and me changed to a wedding."

He asked me to quit going to Brockville, and I went to Detroit to get a situation with my sister. He asked me not to go, with the promise that he would make me a better home than I could get there.

He asked me to marry him then. I made preparations for the wedding by purchasing clothes and several other things which I would not have purchased otherwise.

The defendant told me he was wealthy. Under cross-examination the plaintiff faintly and was carried away. To John H. Moore, McGruer said he had got himself into a bad mess, "and asked me if I thought there was any possibility of him settling it without a course of law."

He told me he had been paying attention to Miss Moorehead and that he was engaged to her for a short time.

McGruer said he had merely flirted with the young woman. When alone "we talked about our future prospects, the crops, etc., but not of marriage. I put my arm around her waist and kissed her several times. I did not lead her to suppose that I liked her."

The witness again quit seeing her and said a reason that he had heard she was intimate with other men.

Adam Steinberg said he had seen proper relations with her ten years ago. He almost faintly while testifying. The jury awarded the plaintiff \$1,000 damages.
