As Set For From Manitoba.

Brandon, Man., Dec. 16, 1892.

Editor Reporter.—

Dear Sir,—If you will please al-
low me a little space in your valuable
paper in regard to this country called
Manitoba, as I notice in a late issue of
your paper that a number of young men
have emigrated across the line. I
would like to tell you why our boys
should go over there in order to make
a living when there is lots of room
for them out here and also lots for
them to do. It is true there have
been many reports circulated in Ontario
regarding Manitoba, and I am sorry
that some people have painted
it very black indeed, while others
have gone to the other extreme and
tried to make things appear far better
than they really are; consequently
many people have been disappointed
in coming to this country and not
finding it as represented. The former
have been led to doubt to circulate
their stories simply because they
have come out here under the
mistaken impression that all they had
to do was to fill their pockets with
gold, which they supposed lay around
like pebbles on the sea shore, and because
they found that they would have
to work for their bread here as
they do anywhere else, when turned
their backs on the country and said it
was no good. These people are victims
of their own foolish imagination.
