**NEWS FROM CHEN-TU.**  
 Extracts from a Letter Written by G. B. Macleod to his Sister.  
 How quickly time flies; how quickly it seems in China than at home. Already our little party has spent two Xmas days in this wonderful land. There is so much to do in studying the language, in preparation for morning and evening Chinese prayers, the days and months slip by with great rapidity. The vacant chair, however, reminds us of the reality of the ever onward step of time with its unpeeped changes. Alas, who knows what a year will bring forth. As Christmas came on Sunday we held our usual meetings, namely, Chinese prayers at half past 8, public preaching at half past 10, catechism half past 2 and our English meeting half past 7. Monday we had our Christmas dinner, which consisted of a goose with the following vegetables: celery, sweet potatoes, carrots, and cabbage. A plum pudding, oranges, walnuts and Chinese confectionery were also indulged in on this festive occasion. A beautiful bouquet of flowers (from a Chinese garden) adorned the table. A goose in Chen-tu costs about 40 cents; oranges three for a cent, a bouquet of flowers 2 cents and vegetables upon the same scale. Some things in Chen-tu are very cheap while sugar, coal, milk, coal oil and articles not in general use are very dear. Besides the members of our own mission, there were seven foreigners present, three ladies and four gentlemen, all singing. England, United States, and Canada were represented and their respective merits were held forth in short speeches. The evening was spent in singing Xmas carols.  
 New Year's day, however, was the day which will be looked back upon with special interest. In the evening a most interesting and profitable meeting was conducted by Dr. Hart. The three little ones which were sent to us to take the place of the one taken home were baptised. All the foreigners, except two adults and five children, were present. It was a pleasant picture to behold nineteen foreigners in connection with this far western health center. Several Chinese, whom we feel are interested in the gospel, were also invited. These were the first children baptised in Chen-tu. After this service the Lord's Supper was administered. It was a beautiful sight to see the unity that existed between the different denominations in this heathen land. Kneeling at the two long benches brought in for this occasion were five Baptists, seven Church of England, and six Methodists. Unto they sought a blessing to rest upon the work of the year just begun. Cheers for Christ, I believe, the most fervent worker, and though representatives of different denominations, are yet one in Christ. The blessing of the 133rd psalm was truly enjoyed. The Church of England has no settled work here, but have a home where newly arrived missionaries can study.
