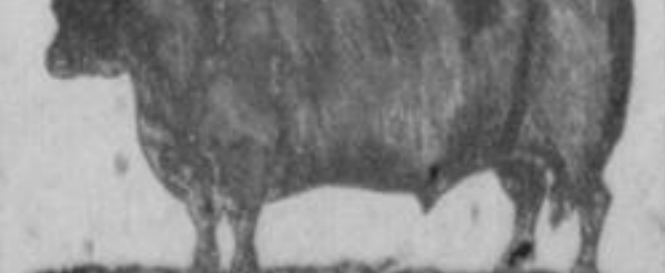

A RUSSIAN BOOMERANG

GERMANY'S CLAIM THAT RUSSIA HAS OVER-REACHED HERSELF. BRASSIA, July 31.-It is generally held here that the tariff war that has been started between Russia and Germany is more likely to cause damage to the former country than the latter. It seems that Russia in applying her maximum tariff on German products was mainly influenced by the unfavorable early reports regarding the harvest prospects in Germany. These reports, it is said, led Russia to believe that Germany's demand for Russian grain, etc., would not retaliate for the imposition by Russia of the highest tariff on imported German products. In the belief, however, she was disappointed, as the prompt action of the federal council in raising the German tariff on German exports to Russia, shows that Germany is not so dependent upon Russian corn.
