ELECTRICITY IN AGRICULTURE.

It Not Only Improves the Quality But Also Increases the Quantity of Crops. In the reports of the minister of agriculture of Ontario there occurs the following regarding the experiments of applying electricity as a promoter of the growth of crops.

The electricity applied to the soil in the following manner: To two poles 15 to 25 meters high or higher if possible, is attached by means of insulators a thick wire or galvanized iron bar ending in the copper wire in the form of a brush.

When both electricity and manure are used, the land gives wonderful results. Several theories have been advanced to explain the favorable effects of electricity on the crops when applied to the soil.
