It is pointed out that a 3 per cent loan, payable in sixty years, issued at 77.32 is exactly equivalent to a 4 per cent loan at par. Highly as wrong the chief responsibility is attributed to the Lieutenant Governor, and it is freely stated that instead of the Lieutenant Governor setting upon the advice of his Premier, the Premier is practically being controlled by his honor."

More serious forest fires are reported in Minnesota.
A terrific storm is raging along the south Atlantic coast.
The Cuban war has caused a great scarcity of silver in Japan.
Prof. Wellman, of the Arctic expedition, has arrived at New York.
It is said that Thursday, November 23, will be proclaimed Thanksgiving Day.
The striking clothing workers of Boston expect to start a co-operative factory.
There was a slight earthquake shock at Chloctuin, Que., on Wednesday morning.
The breach between the Premier and Mr. Hill in the Quebec Cabinet is increasing.
Senator Hill has been again nominated by the Democrats for Governor of New York.
The T. H. & R. promoters have deposited \$50,000 in Hamilton as a guarantee for the completion of the project.
The schooner W. Howe was wrecked on Lake Michigan, and the crew of six drowned.
The Scotch coal owners have resolved to evict from their houses all miners who do not return to work.
Natural gas has been discovered on the farm of Mr. Matthew Gillies, near Eastman's Spring, Ont.
A revolution is imminent in Haiti, as President Hippolyte's tyranny is driving the people to desperation.
A watershed in the mountains of Durango, Mexico, carried away a wood-choppers' camp of 10 families.
A new Cabinet has been formed for Victoria, Australia, by Mr. George Turner, late leader of the Opposition.
The grape crop in Essex county this year is enormous, and the fruit can be had for half a cent a pound in Windsor.
Richard Nichols, aged 55, an old resident of St. Mary's, Ont., attempted to drown himself Friday, but was prevented.
Owing to a business dispute between the owners and the manager, the Montreal (N. B.) Times has temporarily ceased publication.
The Patrons of West York yesterday nominated Mr. J. D. Evans of Enochville to contest the riding at the next Dominion elections.
Earl, the three-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland of Gore Bay, was drowned in a rain barrel by his mother in a fit of insanity.
Prof. O. E. Lewis, of Syracuse N.Y., has a flying machine, which he claims can be successfully worked. It will be tried in a short time.
Mr. Samuel Carley, the well-known Montreal merchant, had a narrow escape recently from falling into a crevasse while touring in the Alps.

It is reported there are anarchist attempts to assassinate President Iglesias, of Costa Rica, has been failed, and the leading conspirators arrested.

Lieut. Kirpatrick, Capt. Vane and Capt. Skinner, graduates of the R.M.C., Kingston, have been appointed teachers on the staff of the new school, England.
Joseph Hartley, a Winnipeg laborer, three months ago came into possession of a fortune of \$50,000. He died in the hospital Tuesday from excessive drinking.
A convention of the Liberals of North Ontario will be held at Beaverton on Wednesday, October 21, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for the House of Commons.
Mr. W. A. Shepard, ex-president of the Toronto and manager of The Mail, printing department, died Friday night in Toronto of heart failure. He was sixty-five years of age.
The New York Central annual report shows a decrease of three and a quarter millions in freight earnings, as compared with last year, but the passenger earnings increased \$1,600,000.
Lieut. Green, 5th United States Infantry, reports that Elliott had found and buried the body of George Colgate, who was left in the mountains of Montana by the Carlin party last fall.
During the recent fair grounds at Worthington, Minn., the grand stand collapsed, burying about 500 people in the wreck. Ninety were killed outright, but about 30 were more or less injured.
An official of the Chinese legation at Washington says that the bottle of Yalu river water, which was sent to the United States, was a fraud, and was not sent equally. He admits that the Ping-Yang land fight was a defeat for the Chinese.
Mrs. A. M. Currier, a woman of culture and beauty, is being sued for seduction from apartments rented on State street, Chicago, because it has been learned by the lawyer that she had negro blood in her veins.
Mrs. William C. Dunsheath, of South St. Mary's, Ont., has been staying at Meaford, and on Tuesday last left the house in which she was living to go to the doctor's. Since that time she has not been seen or heard of.
A verdict of manslaughter was returned against the man Lees and his wife, keepers of the Toronto baby farm, at its inquest held last night on the child which was taken from the place recently in a dying condition.
The American Agricultural report of the apple crop shows a heavy yield in New England, a light one in New York and Pennsylvania, and a about crop in Ohio. It says that in Ontario there will be about half an average crop.
At Buffalo, Rev. Frederick Silles, Episcopal pastor of St. Andrew's, Ia., got on a spree, ran out of money, passed a bogus check for \$25 on a city saloonkeeper, and was arrested. Mr. Silles secured a postponement of his case until the next day, and was held in jail until he was able to pay the fine of \$25.
A Fatal Fall.
YARMOUTH, N.S., Sept. 26.—Thomas Carr was on one of the wharves and tried to get a barrel on a truck. A blood vessel burst and he fell into the water. The unfortunate man was dead. He was 20 years of age and a boiler maker by trade. He leaves a wife and six children.
Mrs. Dunsheath's Body Found.
WINDSOR, Oct. 1.—The body of Mrs. W. C. Dunsheath, of South St. Mary's, Ont., who disappeared from here on Tuesday last, was found in the river just above the windmill dam. It is supposed she fell from a low bridge over the river and was blown down by the wind. Mr. Cameron, of Owen Sound, will hold an inquest.

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
